Among other statutes passed at the time of the Reformation was one which declared that the Sovereign of this kingdom should be the supreme head of the Church of Christ in England, or which contained words to that effect. In the reign of Queen Mary all the statutes pass-The Act 1st of Elizabeth, although it revived those statutes generally, did not revive the particular statute to which he had referred ; but the 1st of Elizabeth contained an enactmen providing that the Sovereign should be supreme in all causes, ecclesiastical or civil, and therefore in common parlance they spoke of the supremacy of the Crown."
