Mr. Speaker: Order, please. I wonder whether the hon. member has a supplementary question to ask. We should not enter into debate.

Mr. Comeau: Mr. Speaker, may I direct a supplementary question to the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources. In view of the fact that the price of oil and gas is to be considerably higher on the east coast, will the minister now consider supplying Canadian oil and gas to the east coast?

Hon. J. J. Greene (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): Mr. Speaker, the price increases announced today, resulting from higher world petroleum prices as well as higher tanker costs, are being considered by my department and by the National Energy Board.

Mr. Stanfield: Does the minister think he will roll them back?

Mr. Greene: Any conclusions with respect to the viability of a pipeline will be very carefully considered by the board. In the meantime, the National Energy Board is prepared to consider quickly an application by any entrepreneur wishing to build a pipeline to the Montreal market.

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): No, Mr. Speaker, I have not yet had an opportunity of exploring this matter with the Secretary of State for the United States, nor have my officials. I will bear the hon. member's suggestion in mind.

Mr. Anderson: I have a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker.
