MUNICIPAL GRANTS ACT, 1980

MEASURE TO ESTABLISH

Hon. Paul J. Cosgrove (Minister of Public Works) moved that Bill C-4, respecting grants to municipalities, provinces and other bodies exercising functions of local government that levy real property taxes, be read the second time and referred

to the Standing Committee on National Resources and Public Works.

Mr. Nowlan: On a point of order, Madam Speaker, I thought that in view of the nature of this bill the minister would be making a few introductory remarks on second reading. I was waiting until he spoke. I appreciate the fact that this bill has been around for some time and that it involves a good many municipalities across the country, but in view of the widespread interest in it I certainly thought the minister would tell us, for example, whether this bill, C-4, is identical with the bill brought in by the former minister of finance in the last government as Bill C-3. If so, our discussion might certainly be expedited; a good deal of time could be saved and we could move the bill along and into committee.

Mr. Cosgrove: Madam Speaker, I waited because I thought the hon. gentleman was about to rise to speak on this measure. The short answer to the question he has just raised is that the bill is significantly the same as the one to which he referred. Perhaps I should now comment on the bill before us.

I am pleased to introduce for second reading Bill C-4, which is intended to provide the federal government with new legislation to govern the program of grants to municipalities in lieu of property taxes. The general intent of the bill is to update and expand the federal system of grants in lieu of taxes. This will be good news to many municipalities across Canada, as the hon. member has pointed out. Many members are aware that the bill is in substantially the same form as the measure which was before Parliament on two occasions, initially under the Liberal administration and then under the Conservative administration in the Thirty-first Parliament. I should like to refer to *Hansard* of December 3, 1979, which records the exhaustive comments of members of Parliament on the introduction of this bill on the last occasion.

Throughout my ten years as an elected official in local government in metropolitan Toronto, I was convinced that local governments were in need of increased revenues to respond to their mandate as a responsible level of government. It is therefore particularly gratifying to me to have a role in introducing this bill, albeit a third time, with its modest help for approximately 2,000 Canadian municipalities across Canada.

I know that some members will argue that the bill does not go far enough, and I know there are a number of points of which members have spoken before, but I would urge that the bill, which is in substantial form the same as two bills previously before Parliament, should receive speedy consideration by Parliament because it would indeed give modest financial help to affected and qualifying local governments.

The riding of York-Scarborough which I represent and which will receive some benefits from this bill is the most populous in Canada. In the next few years, the existing 108,000 eligible voters will be joined by many thousands of new residents because most of the land left for residential
