#### MANITOBA AEROSPACE INDUSTRY – GOVERNMENT COMMITMENT

**Mr. John Harvard (Winnipeg-St. James):** Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Deputy Prime Minister. Two years ago, Manitoba lost the CF-18 contract and we will never forget it. As a consolation prize, Bristol Aerospace received the much smaller CF-5 contract. The senior Minister for Manitoba said at the time that the Government has confirmed its responsibility to sustain the aerospace industry in Winnipeg. Now, as a result of last week's Budget, we have lost the CF-5 contract as well. What has happened to the Government's commitment to the aerospace industry in Manitoba? What has happened to the people of Manitoba?

Hon. Bill McKnight (Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, it seems strange that the Hon. Member would state that Manitoba or Bristol Aerospace has lost the CF-5 contracts. He would also put forward something regarding the CF-18 contracts. I can inform the Hon. Member that in the heads-up program of the CF-5, there will be a slight reduction. I can also inform the Hon. Member that there has been a reduction in the CF-18 program.

**Mr. Harvard:** Mr. Speaker, the Minister can try to fool his Tory friends but he will not fool the people of Manitoba.

# AID TO ATLANTIC CANADA
