In our present curriculum, although at first sight students appear to enjoy great freedom in choice of subjects, actual experience shows that $90 \%$ of them take following 16 subjects, thus making these practically obligatory:-

1 in English 1 in Economics
3 in a modern language 4 in Accountancy
3 in Mathematics $\quad 1$ in Bus. Organization
1 in Physics 2 in Commercial Law.

The other 5 subjects, that complete a curriculum, are selected in languages or in economics, or in a combination of these.

It is, of course, fortunate that the students' choice is thus curtailed.. I quote the fact only because we have here something solid to guide us in mapping out a new curriculum of 26 subjects extending over five years.

I shall now set forth such a new curriculum in the form of a general obligatory course supplemented by an optional honour course:Obligatory programme. (19 courses)

1 course in Latin
1 " "English
3 courses in a modern language
3 " "Mathematics
$2 "$
" History and Geography

2 courses in Economics
3 " " Accountancy
1 " " Bus. Organization
2 " " Comnercial Law.
1 course from the 4 - Physics, Biology, Chemistry, Philosophy.
