To my mind, the situation requires that we set ourselves earnestly and diligently to the work of better teaching in the Faculty of Law, keeping in mind that most of our students desire to practice law in this Province and that it is imperative, therefore, that we should prepare them to pass the Bar examinations. It might be well for us also to join with the other interested Universities and with the Bar Examiners to improve the system under which the Bar examinations are conducted.

I am sorry that this letter is so long, but, in view of the importance of its subject-matter to our Faculty, I am sure you will pardon me for so fully discussing it.
