By the way, I an glad to toll you that we heve received this morning official confismation from the City Mall that the city hes deeded the strip of land from Pine Avenue along the road which runs up towards the new Fixe Hall.

While wo are graterul for their considoration of our plea, there is a slight $51 y$ in the ointment, ramely that the taxes on this bit of propesty are likely to be quite excessive owing to its extended fromtage. I suppose the new reed running up to the Yise Hell $\#$ III be paved, and ous shaxe of that will 11 kely run to a good sound figure.

I think you may take it as correct to assume that the policy of the Board of Governora in regar a to the growih of the University is as outlimo d in Mr. Beatty ${ }^{*}$. aderess to the Graduates at the Reunion Dinnez last year. As I have so often stated, in Annual Reports and in public utterances, it is not our policy to aim to attract a large number of students. I am tuite roady and willing to believe that the attendance at the Taiversities of Montreel and Toronto and at the universities of the four Western Provinces will in time always be in excess of ours. I need not here entor into the roasons for these vievs. Hut we shall continue ous poliey of limitiag the number of the student body. You know that we are forced to do this already in Medicine and in Arts and Science. We have facilities which enable us to take care of a larger number of students in trgineering than at present attend, while we could take probably three times the number in tentistry, and certainly some more in Lav. Oux Graduate Faculty will continue to grow.

I believe that in planning the cymnasium, the graduates would be wise to provide for a student body of between four
