NORFOLK, April 7.—Col. Cook, superbly ridden by Butwell, took the prize of the day, the Lynn Haven Hotel Handicap, at Jamestown today. Cherryola had been regarded as a sure thing earlier in the day, but Butwell's colt took the fancy of the better and the heavy weight, old newcomer, The Idol, also landed in front in the feature event. Free Trade had been picked on form by the bookmakers and Lord Elam was early touted for the betting, but the dope was upset by Butwell. The betting was early for the feature event of the day, but King Dods held out to give way to Irish Kid, both in the betting and the race. In the fifth Martine on form should have been the winner with Cherryola a contender, but Marsand at 20 to 1 upset the dope and the order was reversed, the favorites coming in at the tail end of the procession. 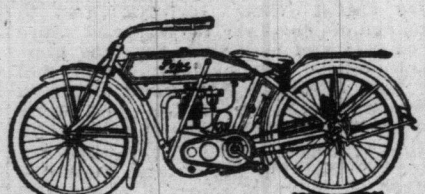

## CANADIAN FENCING CHAMPIONSHIPS

The question asked repeatedly by the fencing devotees of Canada when and where will the next amateur fencing championship meet, has not been announced. The request for sanction has been in the hands of the A.A.U. of C. for several months and evidently looks like another year soiled by the slow movements of the Athletic Union of Canada; 1911 saw the last Canadian fencing championship meet, which, by right of custom, was held in Toronto Central Y.M.C.A. The 1912 had been arranged by the A.A.U. of C. because the student body had not complied with the law of the A.A.U. of C. 30 days' notice. They lacked a week of the required notice. The result was the cancellation of the 1912 meet, with the proviso the meet would be held by Varsity in 1913. This again was impossible, because of no place to hold the meet. Varsity sym. being in the course of building, and the suggestion was made to Toronto Central Y.M.C.A. Fencing Club to hold the meet and thus have Toronto holding the custom of meeting their equal share of the responsibility of running these events. The suggestion was asked several months ago and repeatedly requested an early reply as the season was almost over. The only reply was several letters had been sent to the M.A.A.A. Fencing Club to see what they had to say to the matter. This was no doubt the cause of the delay the fencers in getting a reply to the letters sent to the M.A.A.A.

Ottawa Fencing Club (new club) have also asked for sanction and it is advanced as an opinion the Capital City, Toronto, representative being absent from the meeting, and the students are busy and a further reason lack of funds, except where the expenses are defrayed by their respective associations.

It was agreed by the Central Y.M.C.A. Fencing Club in asking for sanction to have the meet held in Toronto, that unless the M.A.A.A. were going to be represented, the meet would not be run off.

Toronto has retained more fencing championships than any other city in Canada and a meet held in Ottawa or Montreal without Toronto being represented, would not be a representative meet. Some changes in the system of holding the Canadian events have been suggested. Toronto has one and is willing to do its share in trying to overcome some of the objections. Not more than one team should be allowed to compete from each club, thus preventing one of the same club playing in the hands of another team in order to win.

Another suggestion of having experienced fencers judging bouts. The proposition has been and is still good, to have Prof. F. E. Nobbs of the M.A.A.A. (who held Canadian event in 1908), and Charles Walters of Toronto Central Y.M.C.A., who has held, in his credit, both Canadian and Ontario championships, to cease to enter into the individual championships and officiate in judging these events and only represent their respective clubs in team competitions. Walters is willing and it is up to Prof. Nobbs to do likewise. These men are amateurs of experience and would at once give confidence to the contestants.

Some sacrifice must be made by the proposed Amateur Fencing Association, if made and live, organizations would be helped in developing the art in Canada.
