MEXICO HAS BIG

First Country in World for Probe, Alleges Need of Silver and Second for

It is a fact, the not so widely known, that Mexico is the world's greatest producer of silver. Its output in 1911 was 79,032,440 fine ounces, and in 1912, 76,500,000 fine ounces, the decrease indicating the state of political unrest and the native preference for fighting rather working.

working.
In copper production Mexico ranks second, and is preceded only by the United States, according to The Engineering Magazine. In 1911 the copper output was 136,430,331 pounds, and in 1912, 158,691,695 pounds. The crepublic takes fifth place in output of gold and is preceded by the Transvaal, United States, Australasia and Russia, in the order named. The production in 1911 was 24,880,100 fine ounces and in 1912, 22,500,000 fine ounces.

The copper production increased in spite of revolutionary activity, but this apparent anomaly is explained by the fact that the greatest copper-producing properties are in the nor-thern part of the country near the United States border, where active United States border, where active interference was not great, the mines being large enough to protect themselves against ordinary imposition.

The precious metal mines, on the contrary, are scattered widely thruthe whole country and are often small, isolated and not thickly peopled; comparatively powerless against raids by bands of revolutionary brigands.

SCOTLAND'S GREAT HERRING HARVEST

Year's Catch Shows a Decrease, But Prices Ruled Higher.

The total catch of the Scottish herring fishery in 1913 is 1,084,000 crans, a cran equaling forty-five American gallons, compared with about 1,200,000 crans for the 1912 season. Spring fishing brought about 164,000 crans and the summer season 320,000 crans. At an average of 180 herrings to the cran, the total number landed reaches the enormous figure of 195,120,000.

Altho the year's catch shows a de-rease in total landings, prices have naintained an exceptionally high level, resulting in more profitable returns to the fishermen than the heavier harvest

the fishermen than the heavier harvest of a year ago.

Taking the year's landings at the estimated average price for the year of \$8.76 per cran, the total value of the herrings landed at Scottish ports realized \$5,500,000. This substantial sum, however, does not represent the aggregate value of the Scottish herring harvest, as there romains to be added to the price obtained for the "green fish," salesmen's commission and the wages of all classes of workers on shore dependent on the fishing industry.

SUGGESTS AGE LIMIT

For Fire Fighters, and Physical Examination Every Six Months.

In summing up the case for the city at the fire investigation before Judge Denton yesterday afternoon, William Ferguson, K.C., stated that he thought there should be an administrative head of the fire department other than the uniformed chief. Mr. Fergusop point. ed out from the testimony that at many of the disastrous fires of late

ed out from the testimony that at many of the disastrous fires of late the pressure had been poor or some other obstacle had prevented the firemen from effectively fighting the flames. Despite this fact, no record had been kept or report made to the chief, other than by telephone as to what had caused the heavy loss.

Mr. Ferguson advised that an age limit be set for firemen, and that it be rigidly enforced. He was also in favor of supplying each fireman with a map of the city, showing the locations of fire mains, stations, boxes and places where explosives were stored. Every fireman should also be required to pass a physical examination at the end of every six months.

Office Men Needed.

While the department had grown with the city, said Mr. Ferguson, the administrative branch had not expanded. He thought that the department should be directed by an administrator, who could sit in his office and receive the report of fires.

The investigation will continue to-day.

LONDON'S HACKMEN STRAPPED TO SEAT

pels Drivers to Take This Precaution.

It is anounced from London that, according to new bylaws recently passed by the county council, the drivers of hansom cabs and four-wheelers

ers of hansom cabs and four-wheelers in the English metropolis must be strapped to their seats.

It is explained that many hackmen have from time to time lost their lives thru falling off their seat, but that such accidents have never taught wisdom to the drivers, who have always protested that they were not going to be tied like babies in perambulators.

But now, writes a London correspondent of The Manchester Guardian, the county council insists, and if the men do not strap themselves to their seats they will have to pay anything up to 40 shillings. Forty shillings, by the way, always seem to be the financial limit for offences against bylaws.
