. The fare between Winnipeg and St. Paul
now stands at \$18.75, a reduction from previous
rates.

. The Commercial Bank of Newfoundland
has declared a dividend of 5 per cent. for the
half year.

. A telegram from Ottawa states that the
Baldwin Lumber Mills have been purchased by
Perley & Pattee for \$45,000.

. The Kingston and Montreal Forwarding
Company is constructing at Kingston a new
elevator which is to be one of the finest on the
Lake.

. Some twenty-five men are at work sink-
ing a shaft and opening up a copper mine at
Eagle Head, Gabarus, C.B., said to promise
well.

. A by-law granting \$20,000 bonus to the
Victoria Northern Extension Railway was voted
on the 17th inst. at Malden, Ont., and carried
by a considerable majority.
