This is so nearly what the men ask, and gives such a large number of them the 55-cent rate asked for at once that we anticipate their ac-

ceptance of the award. But this is a matter quite apart from the raising of the fares. To violate the agreement and accept the principle that the city is to share the liabilities of the company, whether for wages or anything else, for the next two years is a proposal that Judge Barron should not have permitted his conceptions of equity to make.

While upon the argument I was rather inclined to think that an order should be made approv-ing the recommendation of the liquida-tors of the sale, further consideration leads me to the conclusion that I should not do so. On the whole I have come to the conclusion that the master exercised a proper and reasonable discretion in refusing under all the circumstances to direct that the liquidators carry out hie sale. The motion is therefore dismissed. I think, on the
