POINTERS FOR HORSE DEALERS. ew Regulations Issued Regarding the In

portation and Exportation-Ports

of Entry Into Canada.

Ottawa, June 14.—(Special.)—The Department of Customs has sent out a circular calling the attention of collectors to the regulations respecting the importation and exportation of horses. The importation of horses from Great Britain and the Continent of Europe is prohibited, except at Montreal, Quebec, St. John, Halifax and Charlottetown, and such other points as may hereafter be designated by the Minister of Agriculture. All horses imported town, and such other points as may hereafter be designated by the Minister of Agriculture. All horses imported from Great Britain or the Continent of Europe destined for Montreal must be inspected at Quebec during summer navigation. Horses from the United States may enter into Canada in bond at ports of Sarnia, Windsor, Amherstburg, Sault Ste. Marie, Rouse's Point, St. Armand's Station, Island Pond, Suspension Bridge (Niagara Falls), International Bridge (Fort Erie), Prescott, Lacolle, Potton, Albercorn, Newport, Beecher's Falls, Agnes and Megantic, for transit through Canada to Montreal, Three Rivers, Quebec, St. John, N.B., Halifax, and such other ports as the Minister of Agriculture may hereafter indicate for exportation to Great Britain, Europe or elsewhere. Inspection is compulsory, whether before importation or exportation, and a certain scale of fees is provided.




