GRIST AT MAGISTRATE'S MILL

Odds and Ends That Came Up at the Sign of the Seals

Yesterdays. Tillie Moore of Dundalk was yesterday sent to the Mercer Reformatory for 23 months for deserting her child in Dr. Fraser's stable about two weeks ago.

Joseph F. West of Louisville, Kentucky, who was arrested at the Woodbine track on a charge of stealing a diamond stud from C. F. Buck was remanded Thursday. An adjournment till the same day was made in the case of F. E. Clarke, charged with bicycle stealing.

Sadie Jackson went down for 60 days for stealing \$4 from a stranger in town. Thomas M. Morris and James Wilson, the two supposed race track touts were remanded till Friday.

Alice Graham will be tried on Thursday on a charge of stealing several articles of clothing from T. C. Trotter of 43 St. George street.

A further remand for a week was made in the case of George A. Phillips, charged with passing raised bills. Mrs. James Rocks was granted an order of protection.

The charge of bigamy against George De Corrie was withdrawn. The Morality Department was unable to prove that De Corrie was married to the woman who was alleged to have been his first wife.

M'LEAN, OF CROWBAR FAME,

Who Slipped From the City Police in 1897, Gets His Deserts in Columbus, Ohio.

"Crowbar Jack" McLean, who escaped from Police Headquarters on July 12, 1897, has at last been located. He has just been sentenced to a four-year term at Columbus, Ohio, for burglary. He was identified by means of a photograph sent by Inspector Stark. McLean was convicted under the name of Charles Mott.

On the day of his escape McLean was captured in the early hours of the morning at Toronto Junction by Detective Davis. He was arrested at the instance of the Barrie police, who wanted him for safe-blowing and burglary.

His two accomplices, Thomas Clarke and Thomas Maloney, are serving terms of 10 and 7 years respectively in Kingston Penitentiary.

Inspector Stark thought the local police were in duty bound to find his whereabouts and it now remains with the Barrie authorities whether he will be brought there for trial after his release at Columbus.

JUDGMENT AGAINST EXECUTOR.

Sued for Work Done and is Awarded Fifty Dollars.

F. W. Kingstone, executor of the estate of the late Catherine Champion, was sued in the County Court yesterday by Alex Brown for \$20 for wages which he alleges Mrs. Champion owed him for work done between Jan. 1, 1897, and Feb. 14, 1898. Brown claimed Mrs. Champion sinned poverty when he asked for his money. In her will, however, she left \$100 to neighbors. The jury awarded the plaintiff a verdict for \$50.

The cases set for trial to-day are: *Portman v. Firstbrook Bros. and Ahn v. Boone*. The suits of *Dunford v. Lawrence Bros.* and *Caldwell v. McLeod* have been adjourned till the September court.

PREPARING FOR THE HOLIDAY.

Many Excursions to Pleasure Resorts To-Morrow—Arrivals and Departures Yesterday.

The slip at the foot of Princess-street is being dredged by the W. E. Phin. The work at that place will be completed this evening. The dredge will then commence at Hogbin coal dock.

The arrivals yesterday were: *Chlora* from Niagara and Lewiston, Lakeside from St. Catharines, *Macassa* from Hamilton, *Hamilton* from Hamilton, *Columbian* from Montreal, *Persia* from Montreal, *Queen City* from Port Dalhousie, schooner *F. Cole*, *Enterprise*, *Swallow*, *Reindeer*, *Cornet* from the lake shore, and *Antelope* from Charlotte with 400 tons of coal for the Conger Coal Company.

The four notice boards situated on the breakwater near the Queen's Wharf were carried away yesterday morning by a schooner. These were recovered, but the fourth could not be found.

The new ferry steamer *Victoria* cleared for Ottawa yesterday afternoon. She will commence her run on the excursion route between Ottawa and Montreal.

A large number are expected to cross the lake to-morrow on the *Niagara Steamer Chloro*.

The *White Star* will run to Long Beach, Lorne Park and Oakville to-morrow. The *Queen City* came in to Church-street Wharf yesterday in tow of the *Gordon* from Port Dalhousie.

The *Macassa* and *Modjeska* will both run to Hamilton to-morrow. A boat will leave at 7.30, 11, 2.30, 5.30 and 9.30, from Geddes' Wharf. The *Northey Baseball Club* of Toronto and *Jackson's Giants* will play a game of ball, and there will also be many other amusements.

The steamer *Lincoln* will convey the members of *Canada Lodge, I.O.O.F.*, to St. Catharines, July 22.

The *Vernal* baggage offices on *Milloy's* and *Geddes' Wharves* have been opened for the season.

The *Chloro* made two trips to *Niagara Falls* and *Lewiston* yesterday. She left *Milloy's Wharf* at 7 a.m. and 2 p.m. A large number patronized both trips.

The *Lakeside* makes two trips to St. Catharines on the holiday, leaving Toronto at 7 a.m. and 2 p.m. Tickets will be issued at 50 cents, return fare.

The *Columbian* cleared for *Charlotte* yesterday morning. On the holiday she will take a large excursion party to *Kingston*.

The *Alberta* came in to *Owen Sound* yesterday with 15,000 bushels of grain, 150 tons of flour and 200 tons of general merchandise.

With 1533 tons of flour, the *Prigden* arrived at *Owen Sound* yesterday morning. The steamer *Hamilton* returned from *Hamilton* yesterday and cleared for the east last night.

The *Persia* cleared for *Hamilton* and St. Catharines yesterday from *Geddes' Wharf*. She will call at Toronto to-day en route to the east.

SCALDED TO DEATH.

Little Son of George Nebbitt Fell Into a Pan of Boiling Water.

Leamington, Ont., May 22.—About 8 o'clock this morning the little son of George Nebbitt of this town was scalded so seriously that he died in a few hours. The mother, in preparing for washing, had put boiling water into a large pan, and was in the act of getting something to quiet the child, when he in tugging at his little cart fell backward into the scalding water. Medical aid was at once called and everything was done to relieve the child. He lingered till noon, when death put an end to his sufferings.

NAPANEE LOCK-UP BROKEN.

A Suspect Who Was Placed There Got Away.

Napanee, Ont., May 22.—A second case of jail-breaking occurred here Saturday night. Chief Adams had arrested and confined a suspicious character in the lock-up. Hearing of some things having been stolen Sunday morning, the chief went to the coop early Sunday morning to search his prisoner. On entering, he discovered that his bird had flown.

It is alleged that Sullivan secured this money on the strength of representations he made regarding his relationship with the Commissioner.

White Cloud Up Again.

White Cloud, an Indian, was arraigned before County Magistrate Ellis yesterday afternoon on a charge of practicing medicine at Markham without the necessary qualifications. He pleaded not guilty, and an adjournment was made till May 30. The defendant intends to secure legal advice and fight the case.

In all the Public Schools two lessons of patriotism will be instilled into the minds of the pupils, both morning and afternoon. The program for Toronto schools has already been given in *The World*. A special one has been prepared for the Normal and the colleges. The program for the Normal will be: "A Study of the British Empire—Its Extent, Resources, History." "Relation of Canada to the Empire." "Romance of Canadian History." In the afternoon patriotic songs will be sung and addresses given by Mr. Sanford Evans and Mr. N. W. Rowell.

Another Pioneer at Rest.

In the death of Mrs. Hattie Mauthle, widow of the late O. Mauthle, at her late home, 738 East Queen-street, one of the few remaining pioneers of the East end was removed.

Mrs. Mauthle was 66 years of age, and came to Toronto from Germany in 1856. After the death of her husband, about 25 years ago, Mrs. Mauthle opened the first grocery store in the vicinity of the Don river. A large family is left to mourn her loss. The remains will be taken to Norway Cemetery this afternoon.

Another Train for Rosebank.

At the request of a large number of the residents of Rosebank, the Grand Trunk officials have decided to give that place a better service during this summer. At present only one train a day stops there, but hereafter No. 5, from Montreal, due here at 6.50 a.m., will call every morning at 6.10.

Will Visit the Falls.

A special train of first-class coaches will convey the *Ottawafalls* excursion to Buffalo and Niagara Falls to-morrow. The train leaves the Union Depot at 8 a.m.

Grocery Clerks to Oshawa.

The Retail Grocery Clerks' and Drivers' Association will hold their annual picnic to Oshawa to-morrow. The Grand Trunk has placed four special trains at their disposal.

Honor to Separate School.

John J. Thompson, who graduated at the De La Salle Institute of this city, won the first year scholarship, \$50, at the recent examinations of the Trinity Medical College, obtaining 448 out of 500 marks.

CLEVER NEWSPAPER MAN DEAD.

Continued Ill-Health Caused Him to Suicide—His Wife Also Dead.

Boston, May 22.—W. T. W. Ball, a well-known newspaper man, and his wife were found dead in bed today in a room filled with the fumes of illuminating gas. Letters written by Mr. Ball, which were lying upon a table, disclosed the fact that it was a case of suicide. Despondency, owing to his continued ill-health, was given as the reason for the act. He was 62 years of age and his wife was 73. For many years he was the dramatic critic of *The Boston Traveller*, also *The Boston Herald* and other dailies. He was a noted Shakespearean commentator, and was a man of recognized culture and learning.

Bradley-Martins Swore Off.

New York, May 22.—President Feltner of the Tax Department stated to-day that Mr. and Mrs. Bradley-Martins had appeared before him last month and had sworn off their personal assets of \$200,000. They simply made affidavits that they were not residents of this city, and were consequently exempt from the payment of personal taxes.

Swallowed a Lead Pencil.

Kingston, Ont., May 22.—A young son of Mr. Cornell, Portsmouth, swallowed a piece of a lead pencil and had to be removed to the hospital, where he was relieved. He was nearly suffocated by the lodgment of the pencil in his throat. The pencil had a nicked top and an eraser.

WHERE WAS BOB, SON OF BATTLE?

Useless Dogs Destroyed a Valuable Herd of Sheep Belonging to Mr. T. C. Patteson.

Woodstock, May 22.—(Special.)—Mr. T. C. Patteson was here Sunday morning, summoned by a telegram from his foreman at Eastwood, which told him of the total destruction of his famous flock of Shropshire sheep by dogs during the previous night. Those not killed are so mutilated as to be useless. Any lambs that escaped are dying for want of their mothers. The pastures are all littered with carcasses, and the sheep had evidently been driven all over the farm. There was a bunch of valuable rams being got together for the Northwest, all of which are killed. The flock was established in 1880, and was the first Canadian flock to come under American registration. The loss is a serious one.

The Pacific Cable.

Saturday Review: Rightly or wrongly, both Australia and Canada regard the government's offer of contribution to the Pacific cable as falling seriously short of the arrangements they were originally led to expect. Mr. Chamberlain, with a full memory of what was said on the subject at the Colonial Office conference two years ago, cannot be surprised at the sharp criticism with which the unwillingness of the government to participate in the ownership of the cable has been received. The arguments in favor of imperial cables are at least as strong as those in favor of the state ownership of inland telegraphs. It is unfortunate that the government should have such a matter in mind on the fact that the line will be of more immediate importance to the colonies concerned than to the Mother Country. That is not the spirit which prompted the purchase of the Suez Canal.
