McKINLEY AND ROOSEVELT ARE ASSURED THE WINNERS

The Republican Team Suffered Losses in Some Sections, But Made Gains in Others as Compared With the Results Four Years Ago.

New York State as a Whole is Republican, Altho in the Great City Bryan Had a Plurality—Democrats, However, Made Gains in the State and Also in Illinois, But Not Enough to Upset Their Opponents—Indiana, Michigan, the Dakotas, Delaware, Maryland and West Virginia Gave Decided Republican Majorities.

New York, Nov. 6.—(Special).—It became evident at a very early hour this evening that the election of McKinley and Roosevelt was assured. At half-past 8 o'clock returns from nearly two-thirds of the election districts of Greater New York had been received, indicating beyond question that Bryan and Stevenson could not expect more than 25,000 or 30,000 plurality in this Democratic stronghold, and unless there was a landslide in the outside counties beyond all reasonable expectations the plural State of New York had declared in unmistakable terms, altho by a greatly reduced majority, for the Republican candidates. As the night progressed, it only served to confirm this judgment.

Republican Losses and Gains. The returns from Illinois betrayed a like condition. The Republican plurality of 1896 was greatly reduced, but it was still far too large to be overcome. On the other hand, the returns from Indiana, Michigan, the two Dakotas, Utah and Wyoming, as well as Nebraska, seemed to indicate strong Republican gains over 1896. Delaware, Maryland and West Virginia had given decided Republican pluralities. The count in several of the far western States was naturally so delayed as to give little indication of the outcome there, but they had ceased to have a determining effect, and before 10 o'clock the Democratic leaders had given up the contest, and it was announced that Mr. Bryan had gone to bed and was sound asleep.

How Bryan Spent the Day. Received bulletins at his home and was careful about his comments. Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 6.—Mr. Bryan received election returns at his residence in this city. His house was fairly overrun with newspaper men and telegraph operators. Not only was the first floor of the house largely given up to them, but two of the rooms in the second story also. Four telegraph wires were run into the house. Mr. Bryan had with him his brother, Charles Bryan, his former law partner, ex-Senator Talbot, Committee Chairman Dahlman and Attorney Schmidt. Mrs. Bryan had as companions a cousin, Mrs. Rogers, and Mrs. Dahlman.

Hamilton Times Printed a Statement That Mr. Barker Had Cut Down the Wages WHEN MANAGER OF NORTHERN R.R.

Now the Man Alleged to Have Made the Statement Says He Was Misled by a Healer.

Hamilton, Nov. 6.—(Special).—Yesterday the Griggs, thru the medium of their newspaper, started a shameful lie concerning Candidate Samuel Barker, saying that he had reduced the wages of the trackmen to 90 cents a day when manager of the Northern and Northwestern Railway. In spite of the affidavits of the former engineer, Henry Holgate, to the contrary, James Hiscot, who resides on the beach, made a declaration that Mr. Barker made the cut when manager, and his statement was published in The Times. It was alleged today that a certain G. H. Healer got hold of Hiscot when he came into the city last Saturday, and after getting him intoxicated, got him to talk in such a way as to form the basis of the declaration.

It will be a landslide from ocean to ocean to-day if Conservatives stand together.

Scene in Tammany Hall. Boss Croker was confident at first of Bryan's return, but later Doubled.

New York, Nov. 6.—A big crowd and a band to entertain it met Richard Croker when he entered Tammany Hall at 7:30 o'clock this evening. A special wire to carry the election returns was watched closely by many local Democratic leaders. At 7:30 o'clock, on the receipt of some favorable returns from Manhattan and the Bronx, Mr. Croker said: "It is safe to say that Bryan has been elected President of the United States."

At McKinley's Home. The President Received the Returns and Mrs. McKinley Entertained Her Lady Friends.

Canton, Ohio, Nov. 6.—President McKinley received the election returns to-night at his home, surrounded by a large number of his old friends and neighbors, in a large hall.

Montreal, Nov. 6.—(Special).—The supporters of the Tarte-Laurier party in the Province of Quebec have thrown off the pretence of appealing for support in the name of the Liberal party. The Conservative candidates are all pledged now as candidates of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and French-Canadians are appealed to only to support Canadian, Canadian and other French-Canadian names.

A Scheme to Buy Kingston with the Locomotive Works

Hon. William Hartly Has Put Up \$75,000 for the Works, and Mr. Blair Has Ordered Twenty Locomotives for the Government—Fires to Be Started at Once.

Montreal, Nov. 6.—(Special).—On the eve of election the Government has made a coup which it is hoped to capture Kingston. The Kingston Locomotive works, which have been closed for many months, and which formerly employed 400 men, has been purchased from the Bank of Montreal for \$75,000. The Hon. William Hartly has been in town for several days negotiating the deal, and several days ago offered \$65,000 for the works. The bank refused to sell for a cent less than \$75,000, and that cash down. Mr. Hartly waited until this afternoon, and finally agreed to pay the amount and did so immediately afterwards he went to the long distance telephone and notified Kingston. He gave instructions to have the fires started to-morrow morning. He stated that he had an order from Mr. Blair for 20 locomotives.

FIGHT IN NOVA SCOTIA IS WITH CONSERVATIVES

It All Looks as If the Liberal Majority of Four Would be Reversed When the Ballots Are Counted To-Day.

Halifax Will Send Two Conservatives—Minister Fielding is Up Against It—Dr. Borden's Campaign Described by a Clergyman.

Montreal, Nov. 6.—(Special).—A despatch from Halifax, dated today, says: On the eve of the election reports from all parts of Nova Scotia show that the Conservatives will not only upset the provincial Liberal majority of four, but will at least reverse these figures. That this is appreciated by Liberal workers is apparent from the machine methods which have appeared in every constituency.

The Machine is Doing. The Liberals are known to be preparing to poll votes not on the basis, and to meet this, the Conservatives have been forced to place additional men in every booth.

A Returning Officer With Dough. In Richmond County A. E. Morrison, a returning officer, addressed a meeting at West Arichat, in the interests of the Government, and offered to let money on the result of the election.

Halifax is Conservative. Halifax will send two Conservatives. Dr. Borden's Campaign. In King's County Dr. Borden is facing a constituency which elsewhere, and Mr. Foster and Stockton closed their campaign by a large meeting on West side this evening. The St. John fight is a hard and close one. Mr. Foster has had all the advantage in the meetings, and seems to have public sentiment strongly with him.

But Conservatives realize that Mr. Blair is a great election-day campaigner, and that he has been able in four years' administration of the greatest spending department in the Cabinet to provide ample supplies of election-day argument. It is feared that coercion will be used with military men and other employees of the Government. On the other hand, Mr. Foster, by his splendid eloquence and the reasonableness of his appeal, added by the unpopularity of "Patriotism in this locality" city, has created great enthusiasm. It is impossible to make predictions. The majority may be a thousand, and may be either way.

It is considered that the Conservatives will hold Carleton, Charlotte, Northumberland, Westmorland, Restigouche, Kent and Gloucester. They may lose York, that is now doubtful, and Queen's, of success. Queen's and King's are both claimed by local Conservatives.

Dr. Weidens' friends in Albert are saying very little, but are making a great campaign. The prediction of a Conservative majority in New Brunswick still holds good.

Everything goes to show that Tarte's rule is at an end.
