LAND COMPANIES GAINING IN ADMINISTRATION OF WEST

Selling Land Bought at \$1 an Acre for as Much as \$10 an Acre.

Ottawa, July 19.—(Special).—Whether the west is being administered with a view to the interests of the land companies or the promotion of permanent settlement of the country, was a question developing from consideration of the estimates of the department of the interior in the house tonight.

Dr. Roche referred to the operation of the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company, which, he declared, was not fulfilling the terms of its contract. The company was selling lands which it obtained for \$1 an acre from \$5 to \$10 an acre, without any assurance that the settlers would be secured to the country.
