Clever Fielding

Won the Game for London at Hamilton.

Hamilton, June 9.—London's ball team demonstrated its superiority over Hamilton's in fielding ability in yesterday's game, the first on the Hamilton grounds between the leaders of the league. It was clean, sharp fielding that won for the visitors. Hamilton hit much harder and more frequently, but, in half a dozen cases, what would have been safe hits with any other team on the field, were converted into outs. On the whole, therefore, Pitcher Baker's work was better than Pitcher Selver's. Neither issued a pass. Baker struck out nine men and Selver one. The first four men up for London fanned the wind. London was presented with a run by Hagerty in the fourth, with Howell on third and one out. McFadden hit a ground ball to Hagerty, who had lots of time to retire Howell at the plate, but threw to first instead. Hagerty was also responsible for the mischief in the ninth, with two out he cut in front of Phillips on a ground hit, and made a fumble of it. Mohler scoring and Jones reaching first to be scored by a wild pitch and a hit. Hamilton had but two safe hits up to the ninth. In that inning McCann batted for Baker, and made a hit. FITZ LOST!

His Younger and Heavier Opponent Too Much for the Champion.

A Crowd of 9,000 People Watched the Noted Pugilists.

Coney Island, N. Y., June 10.—At the arena of the Coney Island Athletic Club last night James J. Jeffries defeated Robert Fitzsimmons, world's champion in two classes—middleweight and heavyweight—in eleven rounds of whirlwind fighting. He came to the ring a rank outsider, and left it the acknowledged master of the man he defeated. He was never at any time in serious danger, and after the size-up in the earlier rounds, took the lead and was never headed. He had the Australian jaw from Jeffries' dazed Fitz, who stood helpless in the middle of the ring. Jeffries looked at him for a second, and then had him at his mercy, swinging left to the jaw. Fitz went down and out, giving the championship to the Californian. Time of the seventh round, 1:32 1/2.
As soon as Fitz was carried to his corner the spectators crowded over the benches and through the ropes, and the police had great difficulty in keeping the ring clear. The partisans of the Californian almost went crazy in the excitement. Fitz came to very quickly, and Jeffries walked across to the defeated champion's corner, and both shook hands warmly. Judging from the expression on Fitz's face, he did not feel much disgruntled with his defeat.
The tenth round was in reality where the fight ended.
Ten seconds are short, and when the tenth had been counted there was a roar of excitement to welcome the victor. Fitz was carried to his corner, and Robert Fitzsimmons, world's champion in two classes—middleweight and heavyweight—in eleven rounds of whirlwind fighting. 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THE DEFEATED MAN.
Fitzsimmons, the defeated man, was just as good as when he lowered the colors of Corbett. He was just as active, just as clever, just as tricky and just as fearless of punishment. He went unflinchingly to his defeat. He was the aggressor even at moments when he was bleeding and unsteady, and when stunned by the blows he received, he reeled instinctively toward his opponent. He was fighting all the time, and punished his opponent, but found him a different antagonist than he had met. Jeffries fought from a crouching attitude that was hard to get at. He held his head low, his back was bent down, and his left arm was extended. He kept babbling away with his left, and found no trouble in landing it. It was there that his superior reach told. That giant arm served as a sort of human fender to ward off danger. He showed an excellent defensive ability to use both hands with skill. He is game, too, for

he never shrank from his punishment. **SCENE OF BATTLE.**
The fight began and ended amid a scene of intense excitement. The men fought before a crowd of 9,000 people, and stood up in a great beam of blinding white light. It was like a thousand candles, and it showed their great white bodies in strange relief. When the blood came it was of an intense red than usual. There was not a suggestion of interference from the police. Chief Devery occupied a seat by the ring side, but never entered the ring.
The great house filled very slowly, and it was after nine o'clock before the police had to bestir themselves and clear the aisles.
Jeffries was the first of the pugilists to appear. He came through the main entrance, and walked the length of the hall to an accompaniment of cheers at 9:20, while Fitzsimmons, who was accompanied by his Spartan-like wife, gained the building and dressing-room by a rear door.
Fitzsimmons' entry into the ring a few minutes after ten was made the feature of a rather theatrical demonstration. Julian came first and then came the fighter, and the two men, who were bearing a great floral wreath that was almost funeral in appearance. It was inscribed "Good luck to the champion," but the flowers are wilted now. Fitzsimmons bowed ceremoniously to it. Jeffries came next into the arena, and, like his opponent, got a demonstrative reception. Fitzsimmons looked lanky and thin, but his skin was clear, his eyes bright, and his step elastic. He made a great display of American flags at his waist. Jeffries looked sturdy and massive, and seemed a little nervous. He got the worst of the assignment of corners, for the great light from the ring, and the big gong sounded out just as soon as the men had been presented to the crowd. When they squared off Jeffries looked 50 pounds to the good.

THE FIGHT.
The first round was marked by no special features. In the second Jeffries knocked Fitz flat on his back with a straight left on the mouth. The champion was up in two seconds, and then the bell rang. In the third Fitz was bleeding at the nose—first blood for Jeffries. In round five, Fitz led off with a left to the face, splitting Jeffries' eye, which bled freely. Jeffries retaliated with a hard left on the ear. In the sixth, during a clinch, the referee had to separate the men, the round ending in the Australian's favor. In the ninth round the men clinched. Jeffries threw his right over the heart with all his might, and had Fitz guessing when the bell rang. Jeffries had decided the better of the round. In the tenth round, Jeffries again knocked Fitz flat on his back. The Australian got up in five seconds, and was sent down again with his left and right on the jaw. He came up again in five seconds, and Jeffries rushed him in the corner, trying very hard to finish the champion.

THE FINISH.
The eleventh was the last round. Fitz came up slowly, but assumed the aggressive, Jeffries standing off, evidently waiting for a knockout. They clinched three times, coming to close quarters. Jeffries put two hard rights over Fitz's heart, and sent him back. A left on the jaw from Jeffries dazed Fitz, who stood helpless in the middle of the ring. Jeffries looked at him for a second, and then had him at his mercy, swinging left to the jaw. Fitz went down and out, giving the championship to the Californian. Time of the seventh round, 1:32 1/2.
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NOTES.
At 9:05 p.m. admission tickets, which were being sold for \$5, were bringing twice that price. Reserved seats, which were in the hands of speculators, were eagerly bought up for twice the original cost.
Mrs. Fitzsimmons sat on the outside of Bob's dressing room. She did not witness the fight.
No weights were announced, but Jeffries was easily 50 pounds heavier than his opponent.

WESTERN ONTARIO

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GRAND TRUNK TRACKMEN

Will Lay Their Grievances Before Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson.

Statement That No New Men Are at Work in Kingston.
Montreal, June 10.—The executive committee of the Brotherhood of Railway Trackmen are arranging for a deputation from the men to wait upon the president of the G. T. R., Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson, when he arrives in Montreal. This meeting will, of course, depend upon whether the president will consent to see such a deputation, and those who are familiar with the courses followed in such cases, believe he will probably be entirely guided by the management. Mr. Hays, the general manager, has gone to New York to meet Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson on his arrival. It may be assumed that long before the president reaches Montreal he will be in possession of all the details in regard to the strike developments. The special question that is the subject of the deliberations of the executive at the present moment is the expense of bringing so large a deputation to Montreal; but they think they will be able to overcome this. The executive say they have received telegrams stating that the roadmasters in several districts are coaxing the men to go back.

NO NEW MEN AT WORK.
Kingston, June 10.—The Grand Trunk strikers are still hovering about the station grounds here. Constables are on guard, but no new men are at work. French-Canadians and Italians are being placed at various points on the line. Lansdowne new men and constables were arrested, accused of irregularities.

TROUBLE EXPECTED.
Gananogue, June 10.—Yesterday a number of men with two police detectives arrived here from Montreal to take the place of the striking trackmen, but last night a crowd of men numbering about 250 drove out to the junction and ordered them to depart. Time was given them in which to get an engine from Kingston to take them away. When the engine arrived the men departed, as ordered, amid the jeers and taunts of the crowd, but it is now learned that they have returned with additional police protection. The section men are taking no part in these affairs, nor are they seen around at all. A pitched battle is expected at the junction when the mob and police meet.

THE LASH FOR VAGRANTS.
Ottawa, June 10.—At the Hull assizes the grand jury suggested that the law should be changed with respect to vagrancy and petty larceny, so as to allow of such offenders being punished by the lash in addition to imprisonment.

CATERPILLARS STOP A TRAIN.
Walterton, June 10.—The train on its way down from Paisley, when it reached a point near Dunkeld, encountered so many caterpillars that it had to come to a dead halt. Santa Barbara, Cal., June 10.—Lady Frances Broome was arrested here for obstructing the street on which her residence stands. BLOWN TO BITS.
New York, June 8.—Thirty-six buildings, comprising almost the entire plant of the Nordlinger-Charlton Fire Works Company, at Graniteville, Richmond Borough, were blown to bits yesterday afternoon, and the entire fireworks plant practically wiped out of existence. About \$25,000 damage was done to Payne's fireworks factory at Greenfield, L. I., by an explosion.

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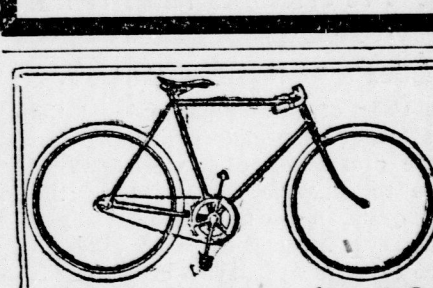
