IN MATTER OF GOOD ROADS

West, Middlesex Spent More Highways in Ten Years than Any Other County.

The seventh annual report on highway improvement, just issued by the County Government, contains some statistics which show that in the matter of good roads Middlesex does not second place to any other county in the Province.

The report covers the ten years 1896-1905. During that period a total of \$1,000,000 was spent by the various municipalities on their roads, an average of \$100,000 yearly. London Township spent the largest amount, \$230,000, an estimated road mileage of 114 miles. The next largest was North Dorchester, with a total of \$150,000, or \$15,000 per year. The other towns in the county were as follows: West, \$120,000; Biddulph, \$100,000; Delaware, \$80,000; Exeter, \$70,000; Lobo, \$60,000; McGillivray, \$50,000; Walsby, \$40,000; Williams West, \$30,000.

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LOBO TOWNSHIP SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Sixteenth Annual Convention—Pleasing and Profitable Programme Given.

The sixth annual convention of the Lobo Township Sunday School Association was held in the Baptist Church, Lobo Village, on the afternoon and evening of Tuesday, June 4, where a goodly number of interested Sunday school workers assembled to enjoy and profit by the good things provided for them by the programme committee. The pastor of the church, Rev. Mr. Marshall, conducted the devotional exercises, after which the vice-president, Mr. D. A. Stewart, of Nairn, was called upon to preside.

The reports given by the secretary, treasurer and other officers, and indicated the interest taken in Sunday school work. The report from the visitors of schools showed an increase of attendance and that new work particularly that of the home department and Bible question course, was being taken up in the various schools. Rev. J. Argo, of Ivan, outlined his method of preparing for teaching the lesson in an able manner.

A very enjoyable feature of the convention was the round table conference conducted by Rev. B. W. Merrill, of Toronto. Much useful knowledge was obtained by the answers given to the various questions.

The Matter of Revivals.

Mr. R. Barclay Spicer, of Philadelphia, addressed the convention very acceptably in the evening on the subject of "The Influence of Education on the Religious Revival." Some of the thoughts expressed were: "The time appears to be ripe for a revival of religious interest and many are looking for a great evangelist to lead in this movement. It is time that education should be directly applied to religious life. We are not to tear down the foundations, but are to work on the superstructures. There is no change in the old religion of Jesus Christ. We are to work not only for our own time but for the future, by giving the child the attention due him to lead him upward along the lines of development, into a child of God. No life is so well worth living as the religious life. We are beginning to reach out for the child before he has become demoralized with sin, and are taking thought for the coming generation by giving prominent place to religious education."

The Sunday School Teacher.

Rev. B. W. Merrill addressed the convention, his theme being the "Sunday School Teacher." The chief points of his address were: "The teacher is a most potent factor in the Sunday school. You may have the best system in the world, but in the final analysis, you come to a man or a woman. The teacher is the hinge on which the success of the Sunday school swings. The teacher's mission is four-fold: 1. As an assistant pastor—to his own class. 2. As an assistant superintendent—to maintain regularity and discipline in his class. 3. As a trainer to mold and shape the child into a pure, noble, Christian manhood. 4. As a teacher—not to entertain or amuse, but to teach. In order to teach there must be two minds, both active and interested."

"The teachers' equipment should be four-fold: 1. Every teacher should know Christ as a personal Saviour. The most important qualification for a teacher is that he be a Christian. 2. Every teacher needs the power of a consecrated life. Influence is the flow of one life into another, the most

enduring influence is that coming from the unconscious influence of a consecrated life. 3. Every teacher must have his heart filled with the Christ life. Christ life can stem the downward tendencies and lift the human life heavenward. 4. Every teacher must have knowledge—he should know what to teach, how to teach, who to teach. He must know his Lord, his Bible, his scholar."

Missionary Instruction.

"Missionary Instruction in the Sunday School," was the subject of an address delivered by Rev. J. Argo, of Ivan, who stated that the responsibility of the church in relation to the non-Christian world is being more largely realized; that the church exists for the purpose of distributing the bread of life to the hungry. The Sunday school is a missionary field itself. It is one of the agencies the church employs for the salvation of the world. No child is properly taught, who is not taught that it is his privilege to carry the Gospel to others.

COBALT NEWS

The district around Barabar Lake is showing up very rich, and all the way round large masses of exposed rock reveal excellent quartz veins. This particular location is exceptionally promising.

Shafts No. 5 and 7 are showing a higher grade of ore at each increased foot of depth.

Interest in Strike.

There was considerable conversation yesterday in mining circles about the big silver strike reported from Cobalt to have been made on Nipissing property. It is believed that if the nugget reaches any such great value as \$600,000, of which about 70 per cent is said to be silver, the find will mean a great deal for Cobalt and will tend to put much more life into the financial activity of the camp and outside places where Cobalt properties are watched.

BIGGEST OF SHOWS COMING

Forepaugh & Sells Bros' Circus Due on June 17.

The free street parade represents an outlay of one million dollars, which shows itself in one long line of surprises, unfolding themselves in endless variety. There is twice as much to the parade as there is to that of any other circus, and every feature in it is exclusive. As to the performance, it is the par excellence of arctic entertainment, filled with European novelties, and offering only the best and newest. Thus the management has gotten completely away from the path well beaten by other circuses.

Another fortune has been spent on the fire spectacle, "Fighting the Flames," which takes the place of the old-time grand entry. It represents a busy city on a fete day threatened with destruction by a fierce fire. A battalion of 40 professional firemen battles with the flames and rescues women and children from high windows by means of life-nets and ladders.
