nead tax from \$4 to \$8, travelers between Canada and the States are wondering how drastically the new regulation will be enforced by the United States authorities. United States Custom Officer Chase received a ruling on the point from Washington a few days ago, in which it is pointed out that legitimate transient travel by Canadians to the States would not be curtailed by the new measure. This will be overcome by refunding the tax or by having means of identification afforded, so that Canadian travelers will be put to a minimum amount of inconvenience.

Local railway ticket agents do not anticipate any trouble after May I, when the new act becomes effective, and all believe that the United States authorities will exercise the utmost discretion in enforcing the regulations.


