STORY GETS OUT HOW RELEASE OF PASTOR SPARLING CAME SO EASILY

William Weichel, the Unionist
Candidate, Pleads Cause
of Pro-German.

DOHERTY TURNS TRICK
Minister of Justice Reverses
Sentence of Internment
in Thirteen Days.

OTHER NOTABLE RELEASES
Montreal Dynamiters and the
Would-Be Welland Canal
Dynamiter Favored.

OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—Public particulars
regarding the release from a detention
camp of Rev. H. A. Sparling, of St.
Peter's Lutheran Church, Kitchener,
have leaked out here, and if anything
were needed to increase the disgust
felt by decent-minded citizens against
the release of a man who had been
interned, William Weichel, the
Unionist candidate, who came here from
the United States about six months after
war broke out, released in thirteen days.

On November 23, the following item
appeared:
The department of justice at Ottawa
has notified the local police to release
from custody Rev. H. A. Sparling, who
has been retained here for the past two
weeks. An investigation was held into
the charges against him and the evi-
dence was considered by the minister of
justice. On the strength of the evi-
dence notification was received.
The evidence, conclusive and irrefu-
table, added by the investigation, in-
cluded the fact that Sparling, who was
interned, was not a German agent, as
H. A. Sparling, D.D., had been sending
money to the war fund of his fatherland
in Germany. The fact was vouchered
for by the Dominion police and immigra-
tion authorities, and the case
against Mr. Sparling was conclusive.

Nevertheless, on representation from
the Unionist candidate, Hon. C. J.
Doherty, minister of justice, freed
him, and kept him from the internment
camp.

The facts have been kept very quiet,
and have not appeared in the Unionist
papers, which, however, have de-
famed the town of Kitchener on the
occasion of the premier's meeting.

Intense indignation is felt here
against the release of a man who was
interned, and the interpretation of justice
by the Dominion Government, which
poses as the exponent of patriot-
ism.

The indignation is being vented
against Weichel, who, while receiving
the endorsement of the prime minister
for the soldiers' vote, has been accus-
tomed to an act aimed against the wel-
fare of these soldiers, and has secured
the release of a man found guilty
of an act.

Strong comment has been made here
on former pardons granted by Hon. Mr.
Doherty. The first man let out by the
minister of justice was Dultman, who
was let out to blow up the Welland Canal.
The second act was to release Tom
Cochran, who stole a million dollars from
Manitoba.

Then he let out two thugs, who com-
bated the release of a man engaged in
a career of dynamiting in Montreal.

**SCOTCH TROOPS TAKE
GERMAN POSITION
ON CAMBRAI FRONT**

LONDON, Dec. 10.—The report from
the British High Commanders in
France tonight says:
A successful operation was carried
out early this morning on the Cambrai
front against a post held by the enemy
east of Bourchies. The hostile detach-
ment defending the position was driven
off by Scottish troops, with the loss of
several Germans killed or taken pris-
oner.

The enemy's artillery was again
active southeast of Cambrai. There
was increased hostile artillery activity
also east and northeast of Ypres, par-
ticularly in the neighborhood of Polygon
wood and Passchendaele.

SPANISH STEAMER BOMBARDED BY SUB; PROTEST TO BERLIN

MADRID, Dec. 10.—Premier of
Albureus made an official announce-
ment today that the Spanish steamship
Claudio had been bombarded by a
German submarine, eight sailors be-
ing killed and others wounded.
The Claudio was bound for an
American port for Spain with a cargo
of sulphates for Spanish use. The
Government is preparing to protest to
Germany.

According to a dispatch from Bilbao,
the Claudio managed to reach port un-
der her own steam.

**COL. MACKLEM IS
FULLY VINDICATED
BY GEN. ROBERTSON**

Military Red Tape Blamed
for Tilbury Officer's
Troubles.

OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—The Citizen to-
day published the following: "Entire
vindication has been given Col. Macklem,
whose famous case aroused the
interest of the whole country, in a
cable which has been received by his
attorneys from Gen. Sir William Robert-
son, chief of staff of the British army.
He wires that now that the facts had
been placed before him he wished to
testify to the authenticity of his papers.
The general cables that no one in Can-
ada had the right to make Macklem
take off his uniform and that he will
be gazetted immediately."

had been discharged from the C. E. F.
in London because of wounds, and had

left for America to dispose of his pat-

LOSS IS \$150,000 WHEN FIRE SWEEPS BIG SUGAR FACTORY

Blaze at Wallaceburg Threat-
ened to Destroy Whole
Plant.

WALLACEBURG, Dec. 10.—Fire
broke out tonight at 10:30
caused a loss of \$150,000 at the big
plant of the Dominion Sugar Company.
The flames were noticed sweeping
through the dryer house and from
there made their way into the large
warehouse. Both were practically de-
stroyed with large quantities of sugar

beets and some valuable electrical ma-
chinery. Soon after the fire broke out
an explosion occurred in which Fore-
man Arthur McFadden sustained a
fractured leg and other injuries. For
at least a million dollars, was threat-
ened, but by hard work the flames were
checked before they reached the main
factory. The loss is fully covered by
insurance. The origin of the fire is a
mystery. The blaze at this time will
seriously inconvenience the firm which
has been receiving tons of sugar beets
from all parts of the country. Work, it
is expected, will start on new buildings
as soon as possible.
