

THREE WOUNDED AND ONCE PRISONER, HE CONQUERS HIS WORK

Serb Officer Passed Through City Saturday.

Andrea Churchich, adjutant officer asprant, passed through the local mobilization center Saturday, stopping to obtain his transportation to Point Levis, Que., where he was going to join the Serbian mobilization camp.

Andrea Churchich, who was en route from Chicago, was the second Serbian officer to pass through this city since the beginning of the war. The man, who in the Canadian army would bear the rank of sergeant-major, was neatly dressed in a khaki uniform closely resembling the uniform worn by Canadian soldiers. His hat was after the style of the Canadian service caps with the small peak.

The officer, who was a returned man, bore three wounds, which had been sustained after three years' service on the Balkan front. While on duty there he was taken prisoner in Russia, and after being interned for some time escaped from the camp and came to America, where he was employed in Chicago recruiting for the Serbian army.

All the man's family had been killed in the war and the officer was killed while fighting at the front were massacred by the invading Germans. The story describing the rank held by him, which were two in number, instead of being placed one by one as the Canadian officers' stars, were grouped together on his shoulder. He also had in his possession a number of medals awarded to him for service at the front, one of which he prized very dearly, it being given to him by the King.

After staying here Saturday afternoon in company with the adjutant from headquarters he left on an evening train for Point Levis, where he will be stationed.

POT AWAY DISTRUST AND SUSPICION SAYS REV. R. S. PEEVER IN DEALING WITH ALLEGED OATH OF THE K. O. F. C.

Pastor of First Methodist Church Tells How One Community Got at Roots of Evil Rumors That Sapped Goodwill and Co-operation.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

I have noticed recently various letters in your paper re the supposed "Blood Oath of the Knights of Columbus," and in your issue of July 12, one of your correspondents, "Win the War," discussed an investigation held by citizens of the town of Renfrew, and their findings as printed in the Renfrew Mercury of November 26, 1915, proving the said supposed oath to be absolutely false.

Renfrew being my home town I wish to state that I know personally all parties referred to in this investigation. The Renfrew Mercury is one of the best edited and most reliable newspapers in this province, having a very large circulation, and a very worthy history of half a century or more to its credit.

Its editors and owners, Smallfield & Son, were and are men of splendid education, integrity and recognized ability as journalists and newspapermen.

The reader may ask, What led to the investigation? The fact: the people of that very progressive town and community have been known for their fine spirit of union and appreciation, of goodwill and co-operation that have been the basis for many years between all citizens, Protestants and Roman Catholics. The result of this spirit is that Renfrew is known widely for its successful business enterprise, which even worthy of a very large city, and also by the fact that it was one of the first, if not the first, to carry local option in the year 1900. This spirit of unity and goodwill is the basis of this possible.

But this kindly feeling among its citizens became greatly disturbed a few years ago by the appearance of a foolish, false and idiotic oath, which created unrest, criticism and suspicion among the people, the best citizens of the town felt that this condition of things should not continue, and so if my memory serves me correctly, on the request of some of the principal Roman Catholics of the town, this committee of reliable and intelligent Protestants, at the loss of time and money, and extended travel, went into the whole matter, and the findings were published in the issue of the Mercury November 26, 1915, in which they state they find no truth in this supposed "Blood Oath of the Knights of Columbus."

I make public my personal knowledge of this matter for these reasons, viz., to help to strengthen the confidence of people in one another. There are times when sympathy and mutual appreciation should obtain among all people. These are times when we should banish from our hearts distrust and suspicion, and refuse to repeat any slander that would be unbecomingly the feelings of others.

Our common pride of citizenship in Canada, and our interest in the great future of world reconstruction on Christian ideals, make it imperative that we should not permit must possess our minds; not of coercion or mere toleration of one of the two religions, but of intelligent, kindly, truthful confidence in, and co-operation with one another. It is the duty of all good citizens to work towards this worthy end. Yours truly,

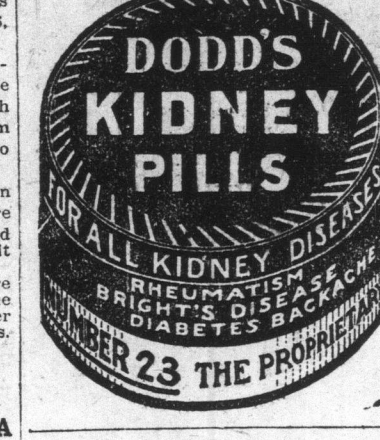
Several departments, however, will not be ready for operation for some weeks, although the greater part of the employees required have been engaged.

KINCARDINE, July 14.—Word was received from Ottawa, on Saturday, by Mr. Matthew Welsh, stating that his son, Corp. Murray Welsh, has been awarded the distinguished conduct medal while serving with the Royal Canadian Dragoons, near St. Quentin, and was reported missing after this battle on March 30, 1918.

He enlisted in October, 1914, and went to France in September, 1915, where he served continuously in the front line until the time he was reported missing. Prior to going overseas he was engaged in railroad work. He is a brother-in-law of Lieut. T. R. Elliot, formerly Western Ontario editor of the Free Press, who is now in England with a 4th Battery draft. No word has been heard of Corp. Welsh, although it is unofficially reported that he is a prisoner of war.

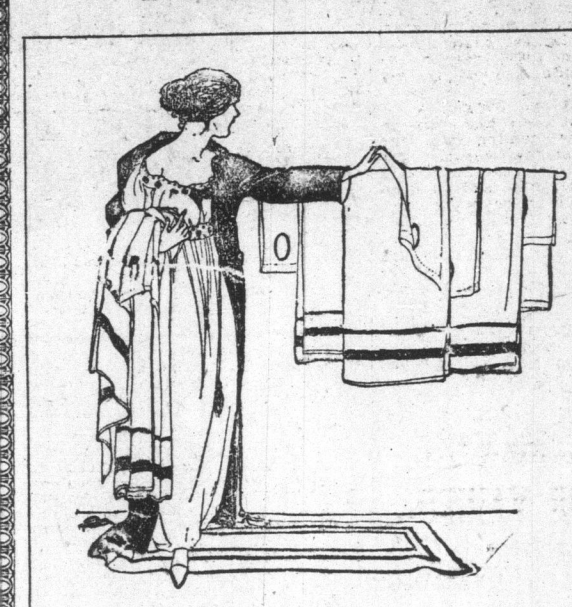
