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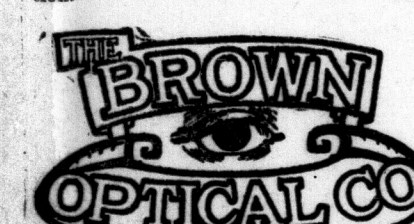

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RUSH CANADIAN WHEAT TO U. S.; FEAR EMBARGO

Western Exporters Quietly Move 45,000,000 Bushels Over Border.

ALL RECORDS FALL

Some of It May Be Designed For Shipment To Europe, Claim.

PORT WILLIAM, Ont., Dec. 7.—(By Canadian Press).—While the United States has been talking about an embargo on Canadian wheat, exporters have quietly moved over the border 45,000,000 bushels of "Western Canada hard." The record wheat rush culminated in the departure from this port in the last 24 hours of fifteen ships, all laden to the gunwales with wheat for export to the United States, notably Buffalo, practically defeating any move that southern growers may make to give their home markets from the Canadian-grown product.

Of 72,584,000 bushels received at elevators in Port William and Port Arthur, 46,420,000 bushels have been shipped to the States more than twice the amount sent last year, which means that Canadian wheat has been marketed a vast amount of their farm produce despite restrictions in European markets. The ships carried 4,465,000 bushels of wheat.

Considering Duty. Although the United States House of Representatives is considering a 45-cent import duty on wheat from this country, as presented in the form of a bill yesterday, together with an import duty of \$1.80 per barrel on flour, the move in response to United States farmers' demands comes too late for this year.

Sees Hurry Effort. N. M. Patterson of this city who was a member of the United States Board during its operation, and who is regarded throughout the West as an authority on grain marketing, sets in the unprecedented movement of wheat from Port William to Buffalo a hurry effort to get under the barrier and dispose of as much Canadian wheat to United States buyers as the traffic will bear before the long-talked-of embargo is put on, or a duty bar raised.

The forty-five million bushels already dispatched to Buffalo and other southern ports takes no count of the enormous shipments that have gone forward since December 3, up to which date the records were available. Five million bushels can still be placed on board vessels now lying in harbor, and before navigation closes Canada will have sent to United States

ASSEMBLY WILL BATTLE TYPHUS WITH BIG FUND

Foster Leads With Ringing Appeal To Stamp Out Disease.

GENEVA, Dec. 6.—War against typhus in the near east occupied the attention of the League assembly this morning to the exclusion of virtually all other business. The debate was on its scope, the representatives of all climates and races taking part.

Sir George E. Foster, the Canadian delegate, led the van with a ringing appeal to the world to stamp out the dread disease, which is gradually spreading over Europe. Others who spoke represented Great Britain, France, India, China, Persia, Norway, Greece, Spain, Holland and Russia.

A large part of the \$250,000 requested to set the campaign in motion was to be used to pay the salaries of the inspectors and the balance will probably be used to pay the expenses of the campaign. The assembly will then begin the work of preparing its recommendations for submission to the cabinet council.

Two Inspectors Are Suspended

Special Provincial Men At Border Out Pending An Investigation.

WINDSOR, Dec. 7.—Pending investigation into charges made against them, Special Provincial Inspectors Smith and Hannan, stationed on the border for a number of years, were tonight suspended from duty by Chief Superintendent Lamn of the Western Ontario division, whose headquarters are located here.

The two officers, formerly free lances, came under the authority of Chief Inspector when appointed inspectors to curb the activities of run-runners. He refused to discuss the case tonight of the nature of the charges against the two men.

TARIFF COMMISSION'S WORK ABOUT COMPLETE

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—(Canadian Press).—The tariff commission returned to Ottawa this morning, its inquiry almost complete. There will be a short session at Kingston, a concluding meeting in Ottawa, and the commission will then begin the actual work of preparing its recommendations for submission to the cabinet council.

MAY BE FOR EUROPE.

TORONTO, Dec. 7.—A member of one of the largest Canadian grain export houses, stated tonight that there was nothing unprecedented at this season in the very large shipments of wheat now taking place from the head of the lakes. It was natural to suppose that under existing circumstances a considerable portion of it might be for sale to United States dealers, but on the other hand it was to be remembered that in normal years two-thirds of Canada's export wheat had been through United States ports.

During the war this was not possible. Wheat shipped to Buffalo and other United States points, designed for export to Europe, might later on be taken out of bond and sold to United States buyers.

ALLIED GOVERNMENTS NOT IN MARKET, CLAIM

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—(By Canadian Press).—The heavy movements of wheat from Port William to the United States have occasioned no surprise to Government officials here, in view of the rapidly closing of navigation, the possibility of a duty being imposed upon Canadian wheat, and the fact that the movement this year has been largely from the head of the lakes. The Allied Governments have not been in the market for Canadian wheat, and the British market has absorbed but little of the Canadian product, up to the present time. The heavy movement by rail from prairie points to the United States, more particularly Duluth, was emphasized at a recent sitting of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange for a ruling providing for the payment of the Canadian part of the international rate in Canadian instead of American currency was considered.

CONSTANTINE TO SAIL FOR ATHENS THURSDAY NEXT

Report Says He Will Pass Through Italy En Route.

ROME, Dec. 7.—According to reports circulated in Greek circles here, King Constantine of Greece will pass through Italy Thursday, sailing from Brindisi for Athens.

Many Greeks, especially from Trieste, Venice, Rome and Naples, plan to return to Greece at the same time that Constantine takes the journey, or shortly thereafter.

RETURNS TO DORCHESTER.

DORCHESTER, Dec. 7.—Dr. Fred L. Neeley, who went overseas with the 142nd London Battalion and since his return has been assistant superintendent of the Ontario Hospital at Hamilton, has returned and will practice here. He is the son of the late George Neeley, M.P.

WORKING OUT PLANS FOR TAKING OVER OF GUELPH RADIAL LINE

Hydro Officials and Sir Adam Beck Hold Meeting At Toronto.

TORONTO, Dec. 7.—P. K. Irwin, city solicitor of Guelph, Ont., and T. J. Hamilton, secretary of the Hydro-Electric Railway Association, conferred this afternoon with Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission; Chief Engineer F. A. Gaby, and Col. MacInnes, of the hydro-electric commission, with reference to the proposed taking over of the Guelph Radial Railway by the hydro commission, on which question the ratemakers of Guelph are to vote on January 1.

Secretary Hannigan, in an interview previous to the conference, stated that Premier Drury had agreed to approve of the hydro commission taking over the railway, provided that the people voted on it as a separate unit. When the question was voted on before the Guelph railway was coupled with the Guelph-Kitchener-Elmira radial line.

In order that the commission might take over the Guelph railway as a separate unit some changes needed to be made in the previous agreement, and it was with reference to this that the conference was held here this afternoon.
