TORONTO PRESBYTERY MAY NOT BE DIVIDED

District an Unwieldy One, But Conditions Would Not Be Greatly Bettered.

A readjustment, or division, of the Toronto Presbytery was discussed at some length yesterday, and a committee, composed of Rev. Dr. McNair, Rev. D. G. Cameron, Rev. W. G. Back, Rev. A. MacGillivray, Rev. Robt. Barker and Messrs. George Keith, W. McLure and James Mitchell were appointed to consider the matter and report at the next meeting.

The general feeling was that the presbytery was unwieldy, governing as it does Toronto and stretching out on the railway lines to Sutton, Newmarket, Bolton, Brampton, Norval, Milton and Oakville.

It is not as large in area as some churches, but the city work alone has become so great as to be sufficient for one presbytery.

On account of the distance between the preaching places in the Sutton district, it is proposed to divide the five congregations and place them under the care of one minister, assisted by the following additional commissioners.

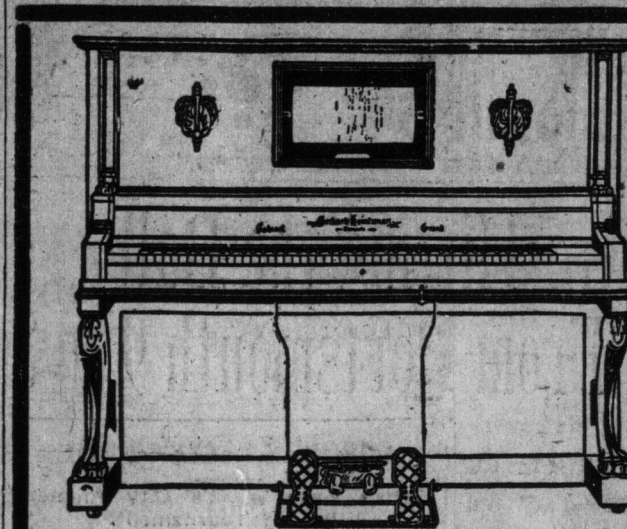
