STRUGGLE OF DROWNING MAN PREVENTS RESCUE

Italian Perishes Before Eves of Several Onlookers—Capt Robertson Undergoes Operation.

HAMILTON, July 8.—(Special.)—Salvatore Macaulio, an Italian, 21 years of age, was drowned at the foot of MacNab-street this afternoon. He was trying to learn to swim and used a plank to keep himself afloat. Several men tried to effect a rescue, but they were afraid to get near him for fear he would take them down with him. The body was recovered by the police and taken to James Dwyer's undertaking establishment. The deceased had been in the country only a short time and was employed at the steel plant. He has no relatives in Canada. There will be no inquest.

Capt. R. A. Robertson, president of the board of trade, who was able to be about his business as usual yesterday, was aided with appendicitis this morning and had to be taken to the City Hospital for an operation. The operation was performed this evening and the patient is reported to be doing well. Mrs. Robertson is out of the city.

DUKE OF LAMBTON MILLS IS OLD BILL DARLING

Purchases a Steamer Trunk and Gets Ready for Long Journey—Laid Brick and Propriety.

Bill Darling is going to London to see the King. As he calls himself, he is Old Bill Darling, but to those who know him he is not so old after all, even tho he is sixty-six years of age. Bill Darling is the Duke of Lambton Mills, and owns the most extensive mushroom estate in the County of York. He was in the city yesterday saying goodbye to his many friends, and was in his usual genial humor.

It is enough to make a man happy to feel that he is going back to the land of his nativity after thirty-seven years of voluntary exile, and he is not going without marks of affection given to him by his friends. According to Bill, Alex. Purse presented him with a bundle of combustibles, and Fred Tremble loaded him up with a box of Arabella's, while Alex. Wright tried to pass on him a gold brick from the Toronto Firebrick Company.

Bill Hamby paid his respects in an article in The Lance, which was under the name of "Bill" than for his wisdom. By the same token Bill Darling has a rod in pickle for the way in which the papers that were up in domestic affairs. When The World saw Bill he had just purchased a small steamer trunk and a suit case, and was in the throes of packing for his long journey, which begins Friday morning.

It is known to but few in Toronto that it was Bill Darling who from 1889 to 1872 acted as chief gardener for the Cornell University, and laid the foundation of the beautiful stretch of garden to be seen at that American university. In the words of Bill, he was a brother professor with Goldwin Smith at that time. It was under Smith that Bill first got into horticulture. Bill brought it because the authorities of that university attempted to make Bill take out his name from the papers that caused his resignation as professor of gardening. Bill says now, as he tells the story, that when he was told to resign, he refused the declaration stating that the applicant for papers renounced allegiance to Queen Victoria. Bill told that just before he went to the States, and that confession, not for the whole of the United States, for Bill is a Britisher exuding patriotism from every pore.

It was called Way Back in '72. So it was that in 1872 Bill landed in Toronto. He got his first job under John Laxton, who was then overseeing a bit of civil improvement. Bill appeared before John one morning and asked him to give him a job. John told him to come and see his father's place, and when Bill got there he saw that the change was so startling that Bill should change his name. However, Bill stayed on the job.

From there he went to laying brick in the Jarvis-street sewer, and prospered. Later he drove a horse-car on the Toronto Street Railway, and drove it so well that he saved money and bought a small farm out at Lambton Mills, where he settled down as a landed proprietor, amassed money, reared a stalwart family, and became a great power in the district.

It is now after thirty-seven years of work this side the Atlantic, with a comfortable bank account, and his property left in charge of Mrs. Darling and her sons, that he feels he is entitled to rest until the fall.

He knows the King, "and I am going to call on him. When I go over to England I am just going to send my card into Buckingham Palace and by-gone I believe he will see me. I used to know him when he was Prince of Wales, because he used to come to my father's place, the New Inn, six miles from Windsor, whenever the harriers met. I, as a boy, knew him well, and drank many a glass of ale with him. I don't think he is too stuck-up not to have a hankering to see the boy he used to meet forty odd years ago. By the way, I am just two months younger than King Edward, and this, to my mind, should bring us closer together."

To those who know Bill Darling the possibility of a meeting between him and King Edward is fraught with great interest, and King Edward, when he does meet Bill, will find in him as sturdy a product of the British nation as he ever cast eyes on.

It is Bill's intention to spend three months in the old land, visiting Huntlyshire, Berkshire and every place of historical interest. It is not unlikely that Bill may be found upon the steps wherever a by-election is being held and the question of licensing is the fore. Bill's motto on this question as expressed by himself is "better liquor and more of it."

Bill's trip will be in company with Lou Scholtes and the rest of the boys who are going over this time to the Olympic games. There will be no more distinguished Canadian at these games than Bill himself, and when the history of the trials is written the presence of the Duke of Lambton Mills will be given a chapter all to itself by the author.

Here's wishing Bill a pleasant voyage and a cordial greeting from the King, and a happy return to those who have learned to love him.

REFUSE DRAINAGE UNTIL DISTRICT IS ANNEXED

Controller Spence Warns That Granting of Favors May Block Forward Movement.

The opinion that the city should not grant drainage connections to residents of York Township pending settlement of the question of annexation was given by Controller Spence at yesterday's board of control meeting.

A number of residents of Hammer-smith, Belfair, Reid, Danforth and Sarah-avenues had applications in for such privileges, and the controller said it struck him as odd "that at a time when we are thinking of extensions, and interested parties are trying to block it, we should give them something that will make their annexation less necessary."

The city engineer said that it was in the city's own sanitary interest that the drainage should be given, and that the courts had decided that the city must grant such requests from out-of-town property owners. He said he would give an opinion on this point.

Extend Albenmar Avenue. The extension of Albenmar-avenue westerly to Hampton-avenue recommended by the city engineer and assessment-commissioner was approved by the works-committee yesterday.

Sterling-road, which extends north and west from Dundas-street immediately west of the bridge, was accepted as a public street, conditional upon the wiping out of a foot reserve along the west side of the street.

On the city engineer's recommendation it was decided to concrete the boulevard on the east side of the street, and to transfer from one car line to another.

Exit Smallpox. For the first time in many months the Swiss Cottage Smallpox Hospital is closed and the staff released, there being no trace of the disease anywhere in the city.

The city architect's department gives the cheering news that more building permits are now being issued than was the case a year ago. This showing is attributed to the easy money conditions as compared with July of 1907, when the stringency was being severely felt, causing many would-be builders to postpone operations for any point without having a full license for their plans.

Control Spence is not in favor of granting the firemen's increases as proposed by Chief Thompson. First year firemen now get \$45, and the controller thinks \$50 should be sufficient of an increase, whereas the chief is asking for a raise to \$60.

A number of complaints have been made to the works department by downtown merchants that the heavy rain on Tuesday resulted in cellars being flooded. In some cases the water rose to a height of 12 feet. The city engineer has appealed, forcibly, to the city trustees to be blame, and that the flooding nuisance will continue until the projected University Creek sewer is built.

The Twelfth at Hanlan's. Special arrangements have been made at Hanlan's Point for the Orange celebration on Saturday. Immediately after the procession concerts will be given by the Royal Grenadiers' Band. There will be two Eastern League baseball games between the Montreal and Toronto teams at one price of admission.

A special attraction of the week is the Arnold's wonderfully trained leopards. This is one of the most unique wild animal exhibitions Toronto has seen for a long time. The Four Lions are acknowledged to be one of the best companies of aerial artists ever seen in Toronto. These exhibitions are given twice every afternoon and evening.

The Golfers' Night Out. The Retail Merchants' Association held their annual picnic at Scarborough Beach yesterday afternoon. The beautiful sand beach, the picnic grounds, the various attractions, supplemented by a fine program of music by Raven's Band, appealed, forcibly, to old and young alike. As the season advances the beach is daily becoming more popular among excursionists and picnickers. Last evening the members of the American Golf Association of advertising interests visited the park in a body. The sensational act of Dave Devil Dash, who rides on a bicycle down an incline, elevated high in the air, and leaps from the machine and dives into a tank of sixty feet below, is proving quite a drawing card. The Kechezuma acrobatic troupe also gave a highly attractive performance.

FENIAN RAID MEMORIAL FOR THE UNIVERSITY. Members of Alumni Will Restore Stained Glass Window Lost in the Big Fire.

In order to perpetuate the memory of those who fell at Ridgeway on June 2, 1866, when repelling the Fenian raid, the graduates of Toronto University, thru their alumni association, have decided to erect in the east hall of University College, what will probably be the finest memorial window to be seen anywhere in Canada.

The announcement is doubly interesting because of the fact that it proposes to restore to the university one of the most valued treasures lost in the regrettable fire of Feb. 14, 1890. The window, which is to be of Canadian design and workmanship throughout, will be somewhat unique so far as coloring is concerned.

The general effect will be a rich golden one, and as it cannot be viewed from any point without having a full sky as a background, the "ensemble," it is stated, will be decidedly striking. The central figure in the main window will represent Minerva armed, emblematic of learning and war, while of the two smaller side windows, one will show a Roman soldier and the other a Roman civilian. The differing widely in character and design from the window which was destroyed in the fire, the connection between the two will be retained by the use of the same inscription, which was specially prepared for the old window by the late Sir Daniel Wilson.

The entire cost of the work, estimated at \$1500, is being raised by subscription from the graduates themselves, the maximum amount to be accepted from anyone being fixed at \$5. H. H. Langton, university librarian, is acting as treasurer.

NEW JAIL GOVERNOR. Charles Wilson of Woodstock Gets Oxford Appointment. WOODSTOCK, July 8.—Mr. Chas. Wilson, this city, today received from the department of justice, the position of Governor of Oxford County Jail, in succession to Mr. John Cameron, who resigned some months ago. Mr. Wilson was recommended by Mr. R. E. Butler, the defeated candidate in North Oxford. He is a lifelong resident of this city, having been born here. He has had an active business and municipal career, having been mayor of the old Town of Woodstock. He at one time opposed the late Sir Oliver Mowat in the contest in North Oxford for the local house. The appointment is a popular one in Woodstock.

Police Chiefs Convene. QUEBEC, July 8.—The convention of the Association of Police Chiefs of Canada opened this morning at 10 o'clock at the city hall by an address of welcome from His Worship the Mayor J. Geo. Garneau. The convention is presided over by Chief Campeau of Montreal. The delegates from Winnipeg, Vancouver and other distant points are present.
