

## LATE LOCALS

Pilot John Thomas goes to Halifax today to bring the Purcell line steamer Almarina to this port. She is due at Halifax the first of next week.

The American barkentine Hancock, Captain Erb, cleared today for New York with 1,400 bales and 32,000 feet spruce plank, shipped by the Gibson Railway and Manufacturing Co.

The steamer Calvin Austin arrived this morning at nine o'clock with 120 passengers. The Penobscot, of the same line, arrived last night and landed 37 passengers.

Engineer Barbour has replied to the mayor's telegram regarding the proposed system of amalgamating with the Brassey street church, resulting in 47 votes being cast in favor of the project and 33 against it. In another part of the city it is given as 43 to 37, which is incorrect.

Officer Lucas, in stopping a runaway on Carmichael street, at about half past noon, was knocked down, the carriage passing over him. His hand and arm were slightly cut, and his leg injured by the wheel. The horse was driven by Jack Francis, and the rig, which belonged to Mr. Short, was badly damaged.

Mrs. A. E. Macaulay leaves to-morrow evening by the steamer Calvin Austin to attend the wedding of her niece, Miss Lillian Macaulay, to Lt. Gordon Macaulay, which will take place on the 8th October at the home of William Courtwell, Mrs. Macaulay will also visit Brooklyn, Mass., New York and Philadelphia before returning home.

## EQUITY COURT

Judgment Given This Morning by Judge Barker in Several Important Suits.

In the Equity Court this morning Mr. Justice Barker, gave judgment in the case of McLoughlin vs Smith in which the plaintiff is allowed a lien upon certain property belonging to the defendant in the way of security.

In the case of Petropoulos vs Williams, the plaintiff's bill was dismissed, but an order was made that the defendant grant to plaintiffs a lease of the premises in question on King street, for the same term as the defendant now holds in the premises and that the costs of this part of the suit be deducted. The action was brought to have set aside the sale of an automatic piano sold by the defendant, F. E. Williams to the plaintiff, Peter and Andrew Petropoulos, all of this city, on the ground that the piano was not up to warrant; also that a certain chattel mortgage given by the plaintiff to the defendant on their goods and chattels, including the piano, for the purpose of securing payment of the piano and certain quantities of cigars bought by the plaintiffs from the defendant; also that the defendant be ordered to sublet the premises in question to the plaintiff, mortgage of it to the defendant, they were estopped from denying their title to it, and in view of the covenant in the mortgage relating to the piano this would be so, notwithstanding there was an agreement in the first place that the piano should not become the property of the plaintiffs until all the notes outstanding on account of it were paid. He also held that the mortgage was not obtained by duress nor through the plaintiffs' lack of knowledge of the English language alleged, but that the plaintiffs gave the mortgage with full knowledge of the facts.

W. W. Allen for plaintiffs; W. H. Trueman for defendant.

In Simonds v. Coster, the referee's report was varied by finding an amount due the plaintiff of \$2,213.80, instead of \$2,430.10.

In Furlong v. Power, S. L. Fairweather moved to confirm the referee's report.

The country market will be well supplied tomorrow with meat, game and vegetables, as well as fruit and dairy products, and Saturday shoppers will do well to start out early in the day if they have any idea of laying in a large and varied supply.

The new vegetables are in splendid condition and good quantities are being displayed at the various stalls and stands.

Roast beef, 14 to 18 cents; beef steak, 16 to 20 cents; stewing beef, 8 to 10 cents; veal, 10 to 16 cents; veal steak, 18 cents; pork, 16 cents; lamb, 16 cents; lamb, fore quarters, 9c.; hind quarters, 14 to 15c.; chops, 16c.; mutton chop, 14 cents; fowl, range from 75c. to \$1.25 per pair.

## BIG ORDER FOR RAILS

(Gloucester Gazette.)

It is said that the Dominion Iron & Steel Company have secured a large order from the United States for overhead rails of 125 pounds. They received the sample rail a few days ago. The mill is working now on the G. T. P. contract for 30,000 tons, and it is understood the manufacture of this rail will be begun as soon as this order is finished. The mill is rushed day and night.

Very little work is being done in the road mill of the company, owing to the serious depression in the market. It is stated that strong pressure will be brought to bear upon the government to increase the duty on wire goods.
