## N. B. POULTRY EXHIBIT OPENS

### Three-day Show Starts in Moncton Tonight—Many Entered

**PREPARATIONS** for the official opening of the New Brunswick Poultry Show at Moncton this evening have been completed and the prospects are that it will be a highly successful affair. Close to a thousand birds have been entered for exhibition which is being staged in the City Hall in the railway city. It is expected by the Westmorland Poultry Association, under whose auspices the show is being held, that the formal proceedings tonight will be participated in by Hon. Lewis Smith, minister of agriculture, and Hon. E. A. Reilly.

During the course of the exhibition which continues through Thursday, Friday and Saturday, there will be a series of lectures, illustrated by lantern slides, given by Leslie Wood, poultry superintendent for the province. Another branch of the work which proves very instructive for competitors and interesting to the general public is the demonstration of killing and stripping which will take place during the show.

Officers of the Westmorland Poultry Association are confident that this year's show will be the best exhibit of poultry ever shown in the province.

## MUNICIPAL HOME FOR YARMOUTH CO.

**Plans For \$58,000 Institution Drawn up—Alternative Plan Turned Down**

**YARMOUTH, Dec. 14**—Plans and specifications for a new building to house the homeless insane within the jurisdiction of Yarmouth county were presented this afternoon to a joint committee composed of members of the councils of the town of Yarmouth and the municipalities of Yarmouth and Argyle by Leslie Farn, architect, of Aylesford. The proposed building would accommodate 40 persons and would cost \$58,000.

The plans submitted by Mr. Farn had first been submitted to the Health Department at Halifax and had been approved by them.

The meeting was held in the Court House here with Warden Churchill in the chair.

## ALTERNATIVE DISAPPROVED

Mr. Farn had also been instructed to prepare a plan for the reconditioning of one of the county poor houses, either the one situated at Argyle or the one at Argyle, as such an institution as required. This, however, Mr. Farn reported against, stating that the committee had concluded that it could be done, it would never be satisfactory and in the end would not prove to be an economic move.

## MONCTON OFFICE FOR P.O. INSPECTOR

### Suite Being Provided in City's Public Building For Mr. Daigle

**MONCTON, Dec. 14**—Moncton's public building, in which is located the post office and customs headquarters, is at present undergoing alterations, a suite of offices being fitted up in the annex over the money order department for Mr. Daigle, the recently appointed post office inspector for the French-Canadian districts in the Maritime Provinces. The offices will be ready for occupation early in the new year. At present the post office inspectors' offices in the provinces are in Saint John for New Brunswick, Halifax for Nova Scotia and Charlottetown for Prince Edward Island. The position to which Mr. Daigle was recently appointed is a new one.

## GOVERNMENT BOAT IS HELD AT DIGBY

**DIGBY, Dec. 14**—Owing to representations made to the Marine and Fisheries Department the patrol boat P. F. 1 has been kept in commission at Digby until some decision is reached as to what steps the Department will take in the matter of protection for the scallop fleet and other craft fishing out of Digby and along the coast.

There is a divergence of opinion among the fishermen as to just what kind of a boat will be the best fitted for protective purposes. It was suggested that the C. G. S. Ariens might be stationed here for the winter or a boat of similar size and power.

## WOULD MAN LIFE STATION

On the other hand a large number of fishermen are anxious that the Bay View Life Saving Station be reopened at once and an up-to-date life boat be procured from there. The boat stationed at Bay View for some years did excellent service, and many rescues are marked to the credit of the crew stationed there at different periods.

## GET EARLY START AT GAGETOWN AREA

**SIX INCHES** of snow in Woods Hills. Lumbermen But More Frost is Needed

**GAGETOWN, Dec. 14**—The snow storms of the past week have been very good hauling, and coming so early in the season will give the lumbermen and others who use the roads an early start on their winter's work. In the woods, where the wind had no effect, there is already over six inches of snow on the level; but despite a temperature of seven below last Sunday, the ground in the woods is still soft.
