

ORGANIZATION IS COMPLETED

Local Red Cross Names Committees for Year's Work

Other Arrangements Made at Meeting For Carrying on Activities.

The Saint John Red Cross Society yesterday afternoon completed organization for the year's work by appointing various committees. Mrs. L. P. Longley, president, was in the chair. The branch undertook to assist with poppy day sales of wreaths, to arrange for a visit by the representative of the dairy branch of the federal department of agriculture and appointed Mrs. Bert Gordon to take charge of its relief work.

Mrs. Walter Hall, secretary, reported 385 new members had been enrolled in the membership drive and half of the fees, \$197.50, are to go to the provincial branch. Thanks were extended to all who assisted in the canvass and a warm tribute was paid to the conveners and workers, especially Mrs. J. H. Doody, ward convener.

CORRESPONDENCE READ.

Correspondence read included a letter from Miss Helen Campbell, of the dairy branch of the Dominion department of agriculture, offering co-operation in a campaign of education as to the food and health values of milk.

Miss S. A. Barrington, provincial organizer of home nursing classes, spoke enthusiastically of the demonstrations given by Miss Campbell and the value of this work. It was decided to offer Miss Campbell the co-operation she asked, the suggestion being that her visit be in February.

The G. W. V. A. asked assistance in Poppy Day sale of wreaths. Poppy Day will be Nov. 7. It was decided to take charge of the sale of wreaths to the churches.

The editor of "The Beacon," published by the patients of Riverview Hospital, asked the society to aid in obtaining subscriptions to the magazine. Endorsement was given the appeal.

The treasurer of the Municipal I. O. D. E. forwarded \$110 given by the primary chapters as follows: Royal Standard, \$25; Fundy, \$10; DeMonts, \$50, and Brunswick, \$20.

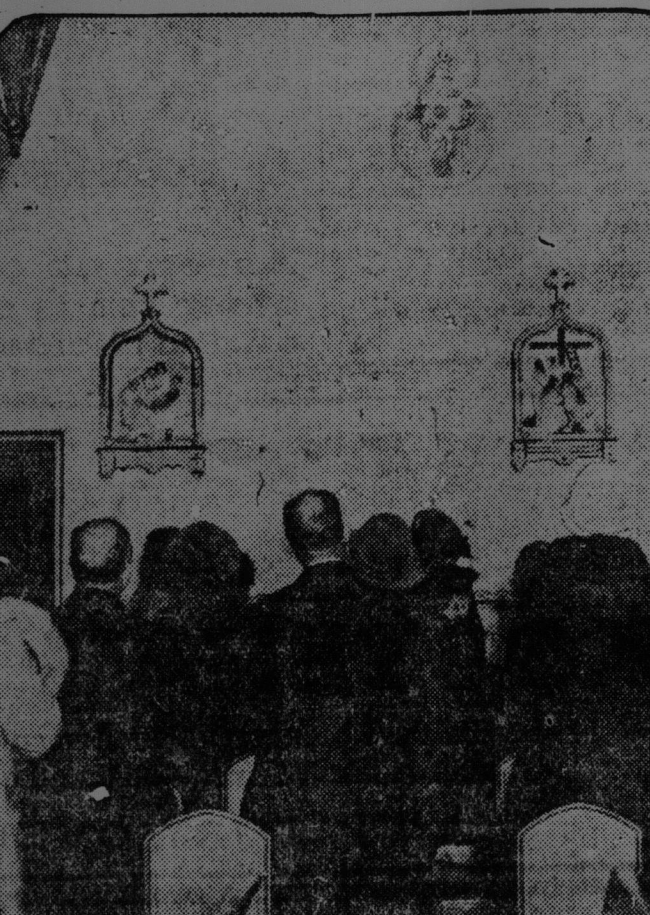
At the meeting this week an initiatory service was conducted by Mr. Golding and his officers of Willis Lodge, the meeting being held in the Orange Hall, Fairville.

Native New Brunswick Author Visiting Brother at Capital.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 28.—Charles G. D. Roberts, poet and prose writer, former resident of Fredericton and native of the adjoining parish of Douglas, lectured tonight before a large audience in the City Opera House here. The lecture was under the auspices of the University of New Brunswick Club of Fredericton. A large audience heard Dr. Roberts, who made a fine impression. The chair was taken by Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education. Officers and members of the executive of the U. N. B. Club were seated on the platform.

Dr. Roberts, who arrived from St. Stephen today, is the guest of his brother, Theodore Goodridge Roberts, Saunders street, during his stay here, which may be prolonged for several days. Dr. Roberts is one of the distinguished graduates of the University of New Brunswick here.

RETRIAL NEXT WEEK

Baxter and Ryan Likely to Face Each Other in Albert Slaying Case.

HOPWELL HILL, Oct. 28.—There was no business for the October session of the Albert county court, which was marked only by formal opening and closing yesterday. The trial of Lawrence E. Doherty, charged with murdering Howard R. Cairns at the latter's home at Harvey on the night of Aug. 11 last, will open next Tuesday, Nov. 3, before His Honor Chief Justice J. H. Barry, the former trial judge. Forty-two new jurors have been summoned by Sheriff Lynds.

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It is understood Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, Premier and Attorney-General, will have assisted with him H. Lester Smith, Crown prosecutor. The accused will be defended by W. M. Ryan, of Saint John. So far as the prosecution is concerned the witnesses will be the same as those giving evidence at the first trial, when the jury stood 11 for conviction and one for acquittal.

Premier Baxter at Milltown Meeting

ST. STEPHEN, Oct. 28.—The Conservative party wound up their speaking campaign tonight with a large meeting at the Eaton Hall, Milltown, when Premier Baxter and R. W. Grimmer, Conservative candidate in Charlotte county, spoke. J. W. Graham was chairman.

Premier Baxter touched on Maritime Rights, the tariff and transportation and dealt at length with the Crow's Nest Pass agreement. He also spoke of the immigration question, stating that the important issue today was to keep Canadians in Canada instead of having them all go out into another country and that the election of the Meighen government would mean that Canadians could stay in their own country and that those that had gone away would be able to come back to a prosperous Canada.

WOUNDED MAN LIES FOR HOUR AND HALF
George Greer, Woodstock, Shot in Stomach; Gun Goes Off Accidentally.

WOODSTOCK, Oct. 28.—A shooting accident occurred at Taffa Lake, north of Millville, last evening, when George Greer, a middle aged resident of Woodstock, received a bad wound when, on placing his gun in a boat, the rifle went off, the bullet entering the pit of his stomach and passing through the small of the back.

Mr. Greer had gone across the lake to a neighboring lumber camp to bring back a lantern, which had been loaned by Dr. Clarke to a woodsman the night before, and it was when about to return that the accident occurred.

In his serious condition following the accident Mr. Greer lay helpless for an hour and a half before his calls

for help were finally heard by a neighboring farmer, by whose aid Greer's return to the camp was effected.

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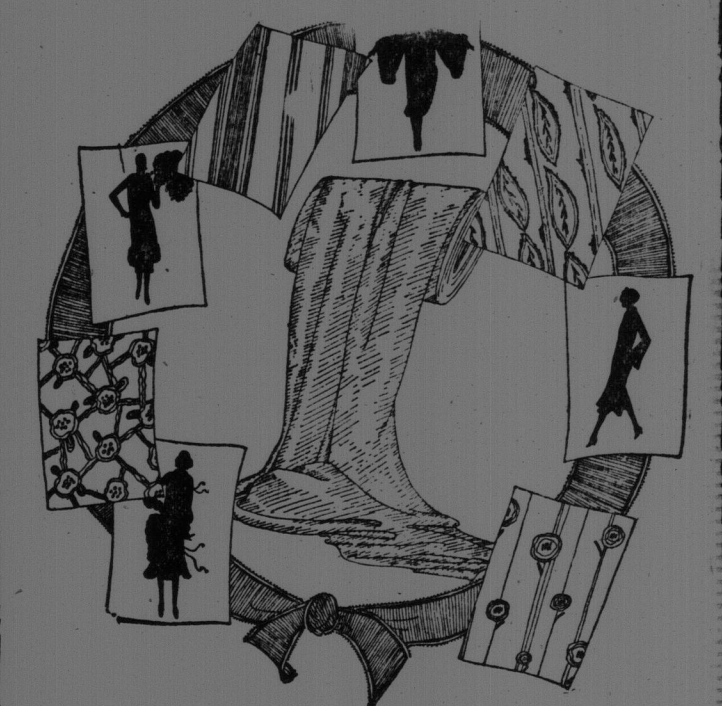
