MONTREAL, Nov. 14 - Full strength, with "Chip" Seeley back in the three-quarter line, and led by Captain Paul Fraser, University of New Brunswick invaded Montreal today, Brunswick invaded Montreal today, with the purpose of taking from the Montreal English Club, the McTier trophy, emblematic of the English rugby championship of Eastern Canada. The winner of today's game, however, would have to satisfy the claims of the Halifax City League to hold the undisputed championship. The game will be played on the McGill campus, starting at 2.30 o'clock. Montreal hopes to have Foulkes at full back, after a two weeks' layoff on account of injuries. But Archibald, one of their Maritime importations on the forward line, and former Mount Allison player, will be missing, having been called away by illness in his family.

PROFESSIONAL HOCKEY in Montreal opens with a loud fanfare on Monday night next when the Victoria Cougars, champions of the world, meet the Montreal Maroons while on Wednesday night, the Pacific Coast visitors take on Canadiens, who lost out in the finals against the Cougars last year after the Hamilton outfit refused to go west. The Cougars' star is Frederickson, who played on the Winnipeg Falcons the time they won the Olympic title in 1920. Against him, the Maroons will pit Nelson Stewart, United States star, while the Canadiens have the flashy Howie Morenz. The proposals of the Saint John hockey club to have a Montreal amateur team here for the opening night arouses some interest in the prospects this year for the Montreal senior teams. Victorias, champions last year, are somewhat riddled because of Sig Slater's departure for New York and the fact that "Boo" Anderson will not play this year. Nationals will place a strong team on the ice this year with Dave Campbell and Beaubien, a University of Montreal star, on the defence. Brisebois, who was with the Sons of Ireland, Quebec, last year, will probably play centre for the French-Canadian team. The Sons of Ireland, with whom several P. E. CANADA'S national summer game, lacrosse, will be played next spring at several of the larger American universities with the Oxford-Cambridge team as guests. The first game is set at Maryland on April 3.

MONTREAL, Nov. 14—The Victoria Cougars, holders of the Stanley Cup, arrived here from Winnipeg this morning. At noon the Montreal team will work out and immediately after their drill, the Patrick clan will go on the ice for one hour. They will probably put in another practice Monday prior to meeting Montreal in the first of the two-game exhibition series here Monday night.

Hector Lepine, well known Montreal amateur hockey player, and last year with Pittsburg, has been signed by Canadiens to a three-year contract. Thus the French team has added to its roster, one of the leading amateur forwards, a player who can fill in at either left wing or centre ice. His acquisition should fill a big gap, as in the last two years, Canadiens have lacked a first rate substitute to relieve Joliat on left wing.
