WILL NOT VOTE ON CANDIDATES ALONE

Boston, Oct. 31.—Referendum questions occupy a lot of space on the ballots which Massachusetts citizens will mark next Tuesday. Seven of these questions will be submitted to all the voters of the state. Of these chief interest has been displayed in the questions of child labor, daylight saving, state prohibition enforcement and a gasoline tax. The others have to do with striking out the word "male" in the constitutional qualifications of voters for certain state offices; adopting constitutional amendment to enable women to hold any state, county or municipal office, and a proposition that any person receiving deposits of money for safekeeping or for transmitting to foreign countries be required to furnish a bond and receive a license from the state bank commissioner.

The question of adopting the two-year system for permanent members of the fire department will be voted upon in the cities of Attleboro, Gardner, Milwau, Woburn and the towns of Saugus. Boston voters will pass upon two plans of city government, one providing for a city council of fifteen members, three to be elected from each of five boroughs for two-year terms, and the other for a city council consisting of one member to be elected from each of the 26 wards for two-year terms.

Brookline voters will act on the question of adopting what is known as Plan B of city government, with a mayor and councilors to be elected biennially, and on the proposition to hold primaries for the nomination of candidates for city election. In Cambridge the voters will decide whether to accept a statute relative to nomination by preliminary elections of candidates for municipal offices. Lowell citizens will determine whether laborers in the employ of that city shall be pensioned.

Lyons and Westfield will vote on biennial city elections. Minor questions relating to city offices will appear on the ballot in Melrose, Revere and Somerville. Essex county voters will vote on the question of acceptance of an act relative to the powers of the trustees of the Essex County Agricultural School. The question of instructing state senators or representatives to vote for legislation providing for non-contributory old age pensions by the state will be passed upon by the voters in the Berkshire senatorial district and in the following representative districts: 10th and 11th Plymouth, 14th and 20th Middlesex and 9th Worcester.

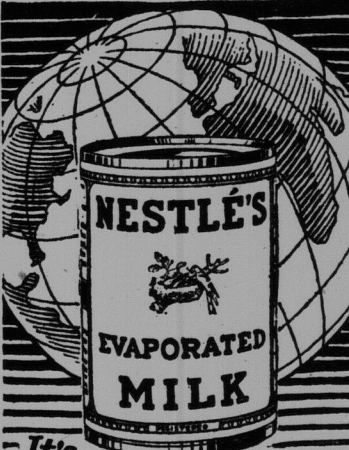
