MORNING NEWS
OVER THE WIRES

A revenue return of \$18,900,000, or
one million more than last year, is shown
by Montreal's 1919 budget. The addi-
tional million will not benefit the city,
however, as it represents school tax.

That Montreal liquor dealers do not
anticipate prohibition is evinced from
the fact that at their annual meeting
they elected officers for next year. They
expect the sentiment of returned sol-
diers, the influence of labor and cessation
of hostilities will act strongly in the way
of a continuation of the licensed sale of
liquors.

W. B. Reek, formerly deputy minister
of agriculture for the province of New
Brunswick, has joined the live stock
branch of the federal department of
agriculture at Ottawa, as assistant to S.
H. Harknell, live stock commissioner. Mr.
Reek says that Canada's huge war debt
can be paid off by live stock exports.

FORMER CROWN PRINCE
RENOUNCES HIS CLAIM

A despatch from Paris says that
Crown Prince Frederick William has re-
nounced his right to the German throne.
Word from Basel quoted the Prince as
saying that he renounced formally and
definitely all rights to the crown of Prus-
sia and the Imperial crown, which
would have fallen to him by the re-
nunciation of the emperor-king or for
other reasons.

A despatch from Berlin quotes Hugo
Haase, secretary of foreign affairs, as
saying that counter revolutionary ten-
dencies exist, but he saw no danger for
the Socialist government.

UNDER ONE ROOF
