It's common sense to save the pence.  
 Foch will smash as we put up the cash.

Money is so plentiful in Canada today that it is really crying out—what must we do to be saved?

Pull tighter the purse strings; take up the slack.

Free-spending on your part means stinting those who do the fighting.

Farmers should save out of regard for what is being done in Flanders' fields.

Saving means cutting off the frills and many of these are only hindrances.

Germany has demanded six billion roubles from Russia. If we save now for Canada, we won't have to save for Germany later.

It is an economic maxim that sudden prosperity leads to injudicious spending. Speaking generally as a nation, we are spending like so many drunken sailors intoxicated with our good times.

True, it is that in many households injudiciousness to thrift are unneeded, not to say impertinent, advice. But there are very many people throughout the length and breadth of the land who have need of being so counselled. For it will

be for every individual to determine how best to practice thrift and save for his own or the nation's future. One's daily outlay should be closely studied. We must forego luxuries, avoid waste, wear clothes until threadbare, restrict purchases to essentials, and be prepared to answer the country's call to lend more money when that call comes.

If the war ended next month how many people would enter the new and difficult peace era with considerable savings from the present inflation of values? Too many householders, as we are well aware, have found advancing costs cutting down their margin for savings. Some have found their increased earnings quite inadequate to meet their heavier outlay. But there are plenty of others who are earning—and spending—larger sums of money than ever before. They fail to realize that the time of plenty and ease is a time to husband resources for the inevitable reaction.

The practice of thrift by the Canadian people now will bring a large accumulation of national savings to secure us in trying change that might occur in the economic situation. It would make possible the continuance of Canada's splendid part in the war and the maintenance of our war financing as a matter of fact, release labor and material for war purposes instead of using these great and scarce necessities for things that we could do without.

**CANON SCOTT MORE**

SERIOUSLY WOUNDED THAN FIRST THOUGHT

Montreal, Oct. 7.—Word received here yesterday indicates that Lieut.-Colonel the Rev. Canon Scott, C. M. G., D. S. O., of Quebec, senior chaplain of the first Canadian division, has been more seriously wounded in action than his cable to his family last week indicated. A cable received yesterday stated that Canon Scott is in the Endsleigh Palace Hospital, London, suffering from shell wounds in both legs and in the right foot. His condition is reported as satisfactory.

**GOVERNMENT CONTROL OF SALE OF GASOLINE IN CANADA**

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—Fuel Controller Magrath announces that regulations have now been approved by the governor-general-in-council to control the wholesale and retail sale of gasoline in Canada. They provide for the licensing of all persons who deal in gasoline in Canada and certain fees are prescribed based on the volume of gasoline sold during the previous year.
