Arthur Clarke Says That he Was Drugged EVIDENCE SENSATIONAL

Defence will Call no Witnesses and Case Goes to Jury This Afternoon - Sgt. Campbell and Detective Lucas Again on Witness Stand

When the circuit court opened this morning at 10 o'clock, the case of Hooper vs Clarke and other police officers, was resumed.

Cross-examined by Mr. Baxter, the witness produced the report book, several entries in which were made in the witness' handwriting.

SHIP STRIKES; CAPTAIN CALMLY LIGHTS CIGAR Sailors and Soldiers Join; Uprising is Successful
