SecondWitness, No.B/28119, Supper Mulholland, H.E. No.1 Canadian Tunnelling Company, states (Not sworn) :

On the afternoon of Friday Dec. 6th. 1940 I was duty D.R. I went to the Transport office to get petrol for my motorcycle. I asked L'Opl. Castanguay for Petrol. He told me to go up to the store and he would follee me. L/Cpl. Castonguay was in charge of the petrol stores which he kept locked. He always issued petrol and oil personne--ally. I went to the petrol stores. When I got there I saw that the window was broken. I didn't notice whether the door was locked or not. Fell was inside the store, kneeling on the table directly, inside the window with a petrol can in each hand. He was facing the window and an appeared to be ready to climb out. I took one tin from him, and found it full of petrol when I later put it in my motorcycle. I notised the window was broken. I usked Fell if he had broken the window. He said no. I asked him why he had not reported the fact that the window was broken. Then L/Opl. Gastongusy arrived. I took the petrol and put it in my motoroycle because I was in a hurry. I had seen the window just after noon the same day. It wasn't broken then.
