

## MANY MORE FORESTERS WANTED

Nearly Ten Thousand Canadians Engaged in Lumbering in British Isles, but Others Needed.

Ottawa, April 12.—Nearly ten thousand Canadians are engaged in lumbering in the British Isles. Of these 5,000 were enlisted for this purpose and sent overseas in forestry battalions while the remainder were recruited from other overseas forces. But many more men are required for this work. Many who cannot qualify for fighting units will be able to meet the requirements of the forestry battalions. Men between 18 and 45, physically developed and over 4 feet, 11 inches in height can pass the examination for this corps. About twelve thousand more men are required. Enlistment depots are established at Digby, St. John and Sussex, Ottawa, Brockville, Kingston, Toronto, Renfrew, North Bay, Sudbury and other important points throughout the Dominion.

## THE ARMY OF BRITAIN ADVANCES IN PALESTINE

Cairo, April 12.—The British are continuing their successes in the vicinity of Gaza, Palestine. Their mounted forces have occupied further Turkish territory to a depth of fifteen miles, consolidating strong positions menacing Gaza and making many prisoners. The losses of the Turks around Gaza are estimated at 8,000, while the British dead, according to the reports received, were fewer than 400. One hundred and ninety British are missing, mostly members of small parties which became isolated in the fog after penetrating the town of Gaza.
