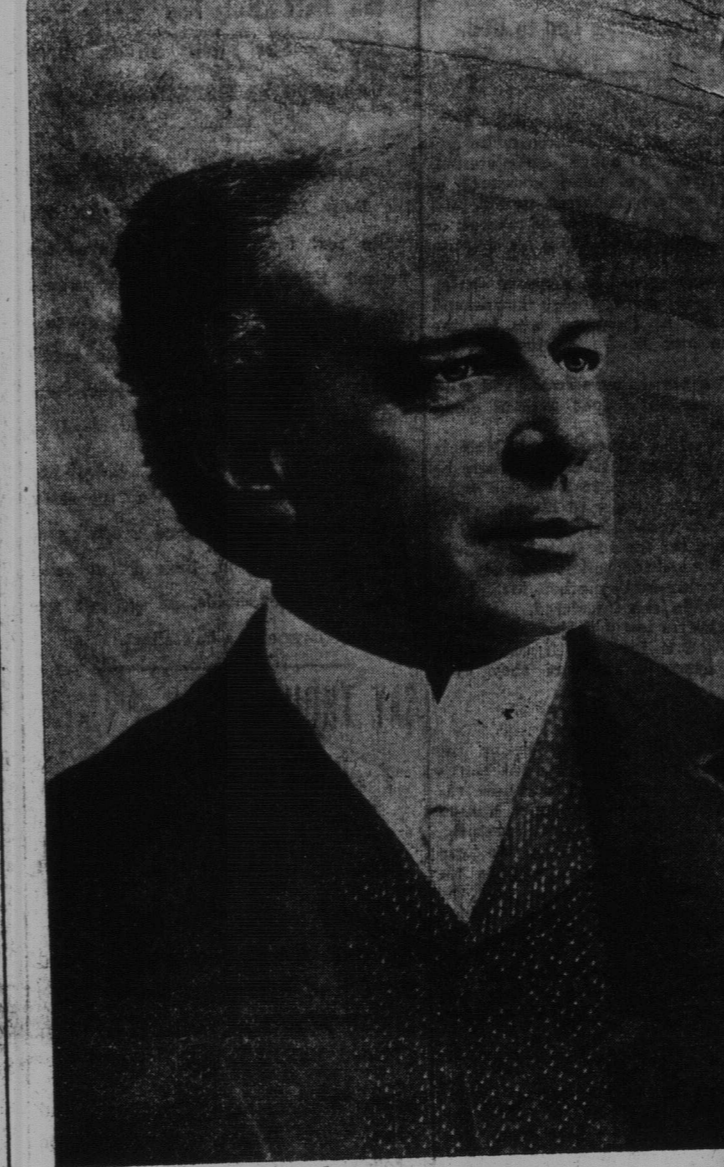
YALE STUDENTS HOLD UP TICKET SPECULATORS.

DROWNED IN THE MIRAMICHI.

Upset, John Rallegan Goes Down; Woman Companion Clings to Craft and is Rescued.

Shamokin, N. B., Nov. 20.—(Special)—A very sad accident occurred here yesterday afternoon. John Rallegan left Nelson in a row boat to go to Munro's mill, opposite Douglastown, for shingles. When returning the boat upset and he was drowned. A woman who was with him clung to the side of the boat until rescued. She deceased was about 50 years old and was proprietor of the Nelson House, Nelson. He leaves a wife. Her body was recovered about an hour after the accident.
