Waterloo Loan Co. Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Waterloo Loan & Savings Company was held Thursday afternoon, in the spacious and handsome Board room of the Dominion Life Assurance Company. The President, Mr. Thos. Hilliard, occupied the chair and among those present were Messrs. P. V. Wilson, manager at the head office at Waterloo, Mr. W. Hartung, manager of the Kitchener branch, E. F. Seagram, Fred Halstead, C. W. Wells, S. B. Bricker, F. S. Kuntz, Dr. W. L. Hilliard, A. K. Crossman, A. B. McBride, E. Hadke, J. Uffelman, and Mr. Devitt, of Waterloo, H. J. Sims, W. J. Motz, Fred Snyder, W. K. Weber, of Kitchener, and P. H. Sims, of Toronto.

The annual report and financial statement showed that the Company had shared very satisfactorily in the prosperous conditions of last year and after paying to shareholders the usual dividend of six per cent. carried a nice sum to reserve accounts and contingent and has a tidy balance on hand.

Congratulatory speeches were made by several of those present. All the former officers and directors were elected, with the exception of Mr. M. M. Bricker, who retired from the directorate by personal request. Mr. H. J. Sims, treasurer, of Kitchener, was elected to the Board in place of Mr. Bricker.
