

into with some Advocate or Attorney duly admitted and practising in the Courts of Civil Judicature in Lower Canada, for and during the space of three years, and shall in all other
 5 respects have complied with and fulfilled the requirements of a certain Ordinance passed in the twenty-fifth year of the Reign of His Majesty, George the Third, chapter four, intituled, "*An Ordinance concerning Advo*
 10 "*cates, Attorneys, Solicitors and Notaries,* 25 Geo. 3, c. 4, cited.
 "and for the more easy collection of His Majesty's revenues," or so much thereof as remains still in force and unrepealed, shall be entitled to be commissioned and to practise as
 15 a Barrister, Advocate, Solicitor, Attorney or Proctor at Law, in any of Her Majesty's Courts of civil jurisdiction in that part of the Province of Canada heretofore Lower Canada; anything in the said Act or Ordinance to the
 20 contrary notwithstanding.

II. And be it enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for any person or persons who shall have graduated or who shall graduate, or who shall have served or who shall serve
 25 a regular and continued course of collegiate study as aforesaid, in any legally established College or University in the United Kingdom of Great Britain or Ireland or in the Province of Canada, and who shall have
 30 served a regular and continued clerkship under a contract in writing for that purpose, made and entered into with some duly admitted and practising Advocate, may be admitted to practise as Barristers, Advocates, Solicitors;
 35 Attorneys or Proctors at Law, in any of Her Majesty's Courts of Civil Jurisdiction in Lower Canada as aforesaid, notwithstanding such person or persons shall have entered into such contractor clerkship before taking such de-
 40 gree or serving such course as aforesaid.

Persons who have received degrees, may be admitted as Barristers, although they may have entered into clerkship before taking such degrees.
