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**4N ADDRESSES TO TEN THOU**  
MICHIGANDERS.

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Beland Must Resist Oppression  
Cost—Trouble Foretold During the

ERCAJANA, Mich., Aug. 28.—Ten of the people attending the Sons of Erin demonstration here today, Michael Davitt said three-quarters of an hour and a half of oratory. During his speech he said: here, to explain to the American people causes and aims of our movement in Ireland. Like all other public men what I face is challenge dissent. Many houses I think we are too conservative; I am satisfied with half-way concessions. How now natural it is for Irishmen desire in this great republic to wish to win the freedom in a way that America will understand the proud, martial character Irishmen who prefer to win by war through the senate house. **A General Improvement in Trade**
