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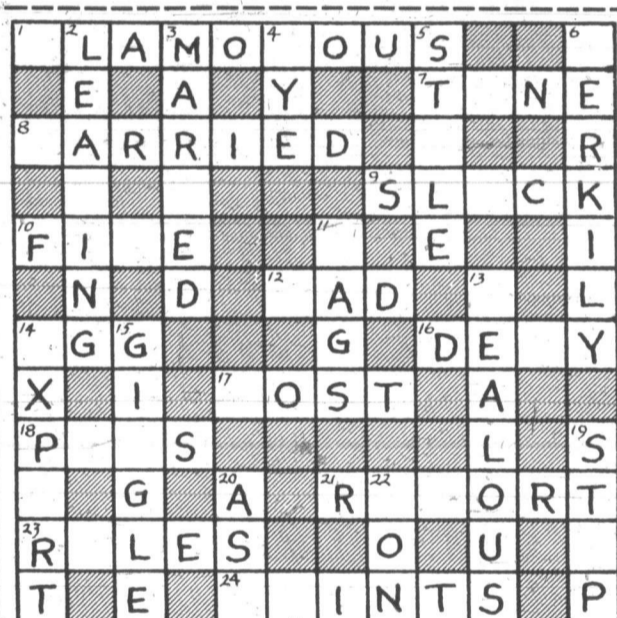

EXPLANATIONS OF MORE DIFFICULT CLUES

6. SEASONABLE not reasonable. "A SEASONABLE bonus," as befits "Christmas"—a time of goodwill. "Good bonus" rather than merely "a reasonable" one — what is "a reasonable bonus" in this instance?
7. GAZE not gape. Gape is already defined as "To stare with open mouth, as in wonder" making "open-mouthed," in the clue superfluous. GAZE makes a straightforward answer.
9. SEND not lend. "Timing his letter to arrive just before Christmas" smacks of soliciting a gift rather than a mere loan (i.e., is more apt for SEND than lend).
10. GET not set. GET ties in directly with the clue word, "ready." The latter being already understood in the word set, and, therefore, pointless to the clue's context.
13. SAVE not have. "Gratifying," (i.e., personal satisfaction)

matches up better with something brought about by himself" (i.e., SAVED the "money" since "to have" the "money" may be no credit to him if he was born wealthy, for instance).

17. GOOD not gold. "A GOOD bracelet of any kind makes a comprehensive answer, indicating gold, platinum, or whatever.

19. STOP not shop. "Wish he could STOP" in order to shop.

21. HANDS not hangs. "May get tangled the" clumsy "way" he; HANDS them to his "mother," yes. It is not "the way" that he hangs (i.e. secures) them to walls, ceilings, etc., that causes them to "tangle," but the handling of them before they are hung.

22. SPICE not space. "Make sure she has enough SPICE," (i.e., check the items and replace any used up). It's not a matter of

2. ROLE not robe. It's not "just" the robe when he's "with" the "children" but the, no doubt, booming voice, funny beard, etc. (i.e., the "Santa Claus ROLE" in its entirety).
3. VAST not fast. VAST, certainly, if they'd really been "hoping for" it, but it's not really fast — it takes quite a time for enough "snow" to "fall" to make "a" truly "white Christmas."
4. DETECT not defest. He "would probably DETECT" it, but a person can be "an abtainer" for, various reasons, such as health requirements, etc., without "detesting the taste of" alcoholic drinks.

5. PONDER not wonder. The clue implies that this is typical of "a fussy person," but anybody might vaguely wonder about what "Christmas card" is suitable, as nobody merely picks cards at random even for "a mere acquaintance." Only "a fussy person is likely to PONDER," however, (i.e., give prolonged thought to the matter).

15. ALLOW not allot. The vaguer ALLOW is the more suitable answer, since you don't actually work out exactly how many drinks per person or glasses "per head to allot."

16. SOUGHT not bought. "If he SOUGHT them (i.e., actually determined to buy "only inexpensive gifts") yes. If for instance, he "bought inexpensive gifts" because they happened to be what took his fancy, giving no thought to their financial value, this wouldn't be so.

18. DRINK not drunk. While "a strict teetotaler" might "tolerate

a DRINK during the festive season," though not at other times, such a person is too strongly opposed to alcohol to regard "a drunk" any more tolerantly than than at any other time of the year.

19. SNAP not snap. "A miniature Christmas tree" is, in fact, often made of pliable man-made materials, difficult "to snap" though "easy to SNAP" with scissors.
