I cannot agree with you that it is obvious that the report was made by an agent of the Commission and not signed by the Commission.

I venture to say there is not one man out of every thousand who may have seen quotations from this report in the press or elsewhere, or who has seen the report itself, who has been aware of the circumstance that the West Report is merely a statement of an agent of the Commission and is not signed by the Commission. The impression almost everyone has who has seen any reference to this report or its contents, is that it is a document carrying with it, as to its reliability, all the authority and sanction of a public body appointed by the United States Government to pronounce impartially upon the situation in Colorado. It was that a false document might appear to have the "necessary sanction for purposes of record" that the Chairman of the Commission allowed the West Report to be printed at the expense of the Commission.
