

unanimously decide to take into consideration all the questions which he had indicated, in spite of the fact that some of them did not appear on the agenda paper.

4. This proposal was unanimously adopted.
5. Sir John BRADBURY proceeded to give an account to the Commission of the result of the démarche which M. Delacroix and himself had been entrusted with the task of making.
6. He reminded the Commission that it was generally agreed that it should seek to conclude with the German Government at the earliest possible date an arrangement on the questions raised by the Experts' Report which were within the Commission's competence. The Commission had realised that it was impossible for it to foresee the conclusions at which the London Conference would arrive, and therefore thought it preferable to seek an understanding with the German Government that effect would be given to any agreement which the Allied Governments and the German Government might conclude respecting the application of the Experts' Report and of any supplementary agreement.
7. The position of the Commission was intermediate between that of a tribunal and that of a purely administrative organism. On the one hand, the Commission was composed of delegates of the Allied Governments whose duty it was to
