### STEAMSHIP LINE TO FRANCE. Reported That the Contract has Been Signed.

Ottawa, Aug. 29.-The contract with Colombier Bros. for the establishment of a steamship service between Bor deaux and Canada has, it is reported, been signed. In return for a subsidy of \$100,000 per annum the -contractors of \$100,000 per annum the contractors undertake to put four steamers on the route and give eighteen trips. If the subsidy is increased to \$133,000 twenty-four trips will be given. The service will be inaugurated on April 1st, and will be effective for ten years. There is a provision that, if found satisfactory, the service may be extended for another five years, in which case the total subsidy for the whole period of fiftees years would be \$2,000,000.
