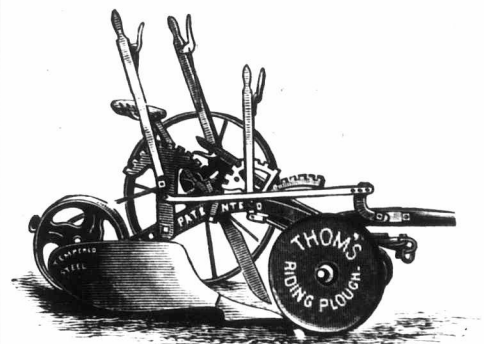

The Provincial Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition, of the Province of Prince Edward Island, will be held on the Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association Grounds, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, the 30th of Sept., 1st, 2nd and 3rd of October, 1890.

Mr. Joseph Vance, of New Hamburg, the importer of Clydesdales, reports the sale of his grand Clydesdale stallion, Wigtown Lad, to Charlton Bros., of Dunfermlie, for \$2,300. Wigtown Lad will head the Charlton Bros. celebrated herd of mares, and compete for the \$1,000 herd prize at Chicago next fall.
