LOAN WILL PROTECT BOTH THE COUNTRY AND COMPANY

Mr. Fielding Explains Reason for Advancing Loan to G.T.P. Is Practically in the Nature of Banking Transaction

OTTAWA, Mar. 30.—The government's resolution providing for temporary assistance by way of a loan of ten million dollars to the Grand Trunk Pacific, to enable the company to finance the balance of the construction of the prairie section, occasioned in the common today a prolonged discussion of the whole bargain between the government and company.

Starting at the top of the department, the government finds in the case of Lieut. Col.
