Thousands of men are already fiected, and there are threats of still further trouble. In almost very case the demand is for increased wages, although the uestion of trade union recognition figures prominently in ome disputes. The building trade is the one most affected. \t any moment 50,000 laborers in the metropolis may adopt a down-tools" policy, and their action would involve another 50,000 skilled artisans.
