ALD WICKETT DIED SUDDENLY

Prominent Toronto Civic Father Passed Away at National Club.

Toronto, Dec. 9.—Great regret was expressed in civic circles yesterday at the sudden death of Ald. Morley Wickett, at the National Club at 1 o'clock on Wednesday morning. The deceased alderman's chair and desk in the council chamber have been draped in view of the meeting of the council to-day. It is intended to pass a vote of condolence and sympathy with Mrs. Wickett and the family in their bereavement, and the members of the council and chief officials will attend the funeral, which will take place on Friday.

Mayor Church, the controllers and aldermen were deeply grieved at the sudden demise of their colleague, who was one of the most valued and highly esteemed members of the council. He took the deepest interest in all civic matters, particularly finance and transportation affairs. His recent criticism of the manner in which the financial affairs of the city are conducted, and of the borrowing for the execution of public works, which he contended ought to have been paid for out of current revenue, created a great impression and resulted in the adoption of several needed reforms. Only at the last council meeting he congratulated his colleagues on having ordered the adoption of a new accounting system in the various departments of the civic service, and declared it was the biggest reform that had been inaugurated for 25 years.

Ald. Wickett was born at Brooklyn, Ont., in 1872, and at the age of 22 graduated from Toronto University. Later he took post-graduate courses at Leipzig, Paris, Berlin, Vienna and Cambridge Universities, and received his Ph.D. degree at the first named.

On his return to Toronto he entered commercial life, becoming a member of the firm of Wickett and Craig, tanners and leather merchants. For several years he was lecturer on political economy at Toronto University. During his connection with the university he took an active interest in all branches of work at that institution. In 1898 he was president of the Literary and Athletic society, and two years later he was elected president of the Canadian Club. He relinquished his duties at the university to devote his whole time to the management of the tannery business. He was a member of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and was delegated by that body to study trade conditions in the Yukon, and later he was sent on a similar mission to Alaska by the Dominion government.
