SPAIN AMAZED AT THE ACT

Loss of Ship From Sub's Attack Causes It to Make Enquiries.

Madrid, via Paris, April 11.—"We are confronted with such an incomprehensibly absurd act that I am loath to believe it until a thorough inquiry has been made," said Count Romanones, the Spanish premier, last night with regard to the torpedoing of the Spanish steamship Santanderino in the Bay of Biscay as a consequence of which four lives were lost.

"I am waiting for full information before taking action," the Premier added, "I may say, however, that preliminary instructions have already been telegraphed to our ambassador in Berlin."
