After a rather lengthy illness, endured with patience and fortitude, Robert O'Hara, Local Master of the Supreme Court, and Deputy Registrar, died at four o'clock yesterday morning, at the family residence, Victoria Ave. As Mr. O'Hara had been seriously ill for some months with kidney disease, and general breaking up, his demise was not unexpected, but, when death at last approached, he sank with suddenness. When the end came all the friends and relatives in this city for the past two weeks, returned to Toronto Monday.

BORN IN ENGLAND. Mr. O'Hara was born in England in 1823, being the eldest son of the late Colonel Walter O'Hara, K. T. S. P., of her Majesty's 47th Regiment. His father moved to Canada while the family was yet young, and settled in stead of West Lodge, about the year 1830. Colonel O'Hara was very prom-inent in military affairs, being at one inent in military affairs, being at one time Deputy Adjutant General of the forces in Canada. The son, Robert, received the greater part of his education at Upper Canada College, together with Magistrate Colonel Dennison, of Toronto, Chief Justice Hagneson, Despending of the Eldron garty, Bishop Baldwin, of the Haron Diocese, Sanator Clemow, of Ottawa, Ex-Premier Hardy, and many other since distinguished Canadians, several of whom have pre-disceased their old

of whom have presented by the call of the bar, and in 1865, being attracted by the excellent 1865; being attracted by the excellent shooting around Chatham, came to this city and entered into partnership with Wm. Doughlas, Q. C. In 1870 he was appointed to the position of Local Master in Chancery, which office he held up to the time of his death.

Purse of London England; James, of Toronto; and Walter and Charles of Boston, Mass. and Walter and Charles of Datos, and Abrother, the late Geoffrey O'Harz, died in Chicago in 1886. He was assistant superintendant of the Pullman Palace Car Company. A fifth sister, Mrs. (Colonel) Hibbert, of London, is also dead. Mr. O'Hara was a first cousin to the late Sir William Gregory, governor of Ceylon and Bombay, and also to the famous Austral-ian explorer, Fobert O'Hara Burke.

MR. O'HARA AS AN AUTHOR. The late Mr. O'Hara was a literary man of marked ability, and achieved before his death an envis ble reputation as an author of some distinction. His work which created the greatest interest among his coterie of admirers in the literary world, coterie of admirers in the literary world, was written in Byronic verse and was entitled, "A month in the marsh" The material for this composition gathered while shooting at St. Anne's club house. He contributed frequently to magazines, his most important productions being translations from the French which language he spoke as fluently as his native English. As a classical scholar Mr. O'Hara had few equals. His intimate knowledge of Greek and Latin was retained even in his more advanced years and he left behind many writings in these ancient languages while it was his delight to scribble maxims and
