

ANTICOSTI.

St. John's Journalist Thinks the Island Too Isolated to Be a Danger Point for Canada.

P. T. McGrath, of The Evening Herald, St. John's, Nfld., discusses the feeling of apprehension that Menier may use his occupancy of Anticosti Island for overt purposes against the peace and security of the Dominion, and that it may eventu-ally fall into the hands of France, and become a positive menace to British prestige at Canada's eastern gateway. He recalls the circumstance that in 1899 the warship Alert was despatched by Mr. Chamberlain to make a thorough examination of the island from a military and naval standpoint. After the return of the Alert from her mission the whole subject was gone into at a confer-enge in St. John's, the result being embodied in a report to Mr. Cham-berlain in which the principal findings were as follows:

1. For the winter months-January, February, March and April -Anticosti is cut off from all communication with the outer world by the ice floes which cover the Gulf of St. Lawrence. 2. During the eight months when Anticosti is safely approachable, by

the navigability of the Gulf, the island suffers from the lack of safe harbors 3. Anticosti has and can have no other system of cable and telegraphic communication save what it enjoys at present by connection with the Canadian wires in the Province of Quebec and their extension by a cable from the mainland at Gaspe ' to

Ellis Bay. 4. To obtain unobstructed access to the island would be a task of exereme difficulty for a French fleet even in war time, unless the British navy had been previously swept from

5. The construction of forts, and the arming of them in particular, would be next to impossible at Anticosti without the British Government becoming aware of the fact. 6. Another difficulty, and one of prime importance, is that comprehended in the inability of Anticosti to provide an adequate supply of coal for the use of a naval squadron using it as a base. So far, no coal has been found on the island, and stocks for commercial use would have to be brought from Cape Breton.
