FIRE-FIGHTING HISTORY.

#### low Canadians and Their Fire Engine

That Canadian methods of fighting re were in the van as far back a 1855 may not be known to many who have followed with admiration the record of our gallant Toronto brigade during the recent disaster, says a correspondent of The Toronto Globe. At the time of the disastrous Globe. At the time of the disastrous fire in Paris, on the Quai de Billey, which occurred on November the 18th, 1855, there was at the Universal Exhibition then being held a Canadian fire engine, named the "Castor." At the commencement of the fire the appearance was so aluming and gave such indications of extension that the Canadian commissioners were induced to place at the disposition of the local authoristies the prize fire engine. It was put in the charge of Mr. Perry, an officer of the Canadian Fire Depart-ment, who was in Paris at the time, who rushed it to the Quai in a re-markably short time, and, drawing the water direct from the Seine, kept several of the local fire engines

kept several of the local fire engines supplied with a constant stream. At the height of the fire, when the flames attacked the military bakehouse, Mr. Perry directed that the whole jet be directed on the flames. The stream was so strong and effective that it cut off the fire at this point, and undoubtedly saved the Government granaries and their immense supplies of corn and flour. Some idea of what this meant to the French people may be gleaned from the fact that stores were always kept in the building to supply forty thouthe fact that stores were always kept in the building to supply forty thousand men for three months.

By a strange coincidence, the Canadian Commissioner had been shown over this building only two days previous, and had taken great interest in the machinery and the new appliances just installed. One of this party, whose name is unfortunately not known, performed a most heroic

party. Whose hame is unfortunately not known, performed a most heroic act at the fire. At the height of the conflagration, hearing the alarm whistle of the boilers (an indication that they were overheated, and would explode unless the steam were let off), though every passage appeared blocked by the smoke and flame, he forced his way into the engine room, guided by the sound of the alarm, opened the valves and saved the building from being blown up.

The splendid work done by the Canadians attracted the attention of

Canadians attracted the attention of all Paris, and Marshal Magnan, through the English Ambassador, ex-pressed the gratitude of the people for the help given them by the Cana-

How the Vladivestock Squadron May Yet Bother Japan-Likely to Cause Separation of Mikado's Fleet-Vice-Admiral Makaroff, the Nansen of the Russian Navy. Who Invented the Ice-Breakers Will Command.

In the war between Russia and Turkey in 1876-77 he commanded the Grand Duke Con-stantine and for brilliant work with stantine and for brilliant work with torpodoes received the decoration of the Order of St. George. Other pro-motions followed in quick succes-sion. In 1856 he took a three years' cruise around the world in the Viti-az and made many scientific discov-eries. A few years ago in the steam-er Ermak, a great ice breaker of his own invention, Makaroff endeavored unsuccessfully to smash his way unsuccessfully to smash his way through the ice to the North role. Other ice broakers designed by him have been of great service to the Russian Government in keeping Bal-tic seaports, Yladivostock harbor and Lake Balkal free from ice.
