#### KEEP UP PRODUCTION

In his speech to the employees of the Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir) Ltd., at the annual picnic at Ladysmith on Saturday, Mr. Thomas Graham, the General Superintendent, made a telling reference to the necessity of every man doing his bit towards speeding up production. The output of coal has fallen behind in the United Kingdom, and the same thing is facing the authorities in the United States. The result is that both Premier Lloyd George and President Wilson have appealed to the coal miners to do all they can to keep the output of the mines up to the highest possible figure. The necessity for this will be apparent to all on a minute's reflection. Many of the industries vital to the prosecution of the war depend upon an unlimited supply of coal. Under such conditions it will readily be seen that the operators must have full time from their employees. Mr. Graham stated that on analysing the figures for his company, he found that the number of absentees averaged ten per cent every day. This meant on the month's operations a deficiency of about 7,000 tons, and a decrease in the payroll of \$25,000. After making full allowance for the arduous nature of the work of the miners, this percentage is altogether too high. According to the Premier of Great Britain and the President

material has fallen into their hands. The French in one section alone, eat into the German line to a depth of six miles and recaptured forty villages. The Hun is going back with the increasing momentum. There never was any sound ground for doubt that eventually he would do so, even when he was at the height of his striking power this summer. Indeed at that time Foch gave a special interview to a London publication for reassurance purposes in which he forecasted just what is happening now. He declared then that no successful leader remained on the defensive, but husbanded his reserves "like a miser," giving ground to be able to do so, until his chosen moment when he struck with all his power a "blow surpassing in violence everything that had preceded it." Unfortunately, many people refused to be reassured; they appeared to think that the greatest soldier of the age was bluffing. We always have maintained that the Germans have had but one good chance of winning the war by a victory on land. That chance was in August-September, 1914, and went a-glimmering at the Marne. Since then the enemy has had good chances of winning battles on land but not the war. Since his opening blow in 1914 his best chance of winning the war anywhere lay in his submarine campaign, and that also has collapsed.

#### KAISERIN WHO IS ILL

IS REPORTED WORSE  
London, Aug. 28.—The German Kaiserin who has been ill for some days, has taken a turn for the worse, according to a message received in Amsterdam from Dusseldorf and forwarded to the Exchange Telegraph. The message adds that her heart displays increasing weakness. Kaiser Wilhelm has not been able to leave the bedside of his wife, who is at the castle at Wilhelmshohe. He declared that no bulletin on the Kaiserin's condition would be published in order not to alarm the people.

#### DOMINION THEATRE

#### GERMAN BODIES

ON DANISH COAST  
Copenhagen, Aug. 27.—It is reported by the authorities in Jutland that during the past few days the bodies of 136 German marines have been washed ashore on the Western coast of Jutland. The authorities say that it has been substantiated that the marines were on German destroyers, which likely were lost during an engagement or by coming in contact with mines.

#### STEFANSSON MAKES HIS WAY UP YUKON

Juneau, Alaska, Aug. 28.—Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Arctic explorer, and discoverer of the "blond Eskimo," received a telegram from the explorer in which Stefansson declared that he probably would stop over for a few days at Juneau. He expected to be at Dawson next Friday, and said that it may take a year for him to recover fully from the effects of his recent attack of typhoid fever.

#### RAILS AND EQUIPMENT FOR ISLAND RAILWAY

Canadian Northern Railway Construction Will Commence in a Few Days.  
Telegraphic advices have reached the Provincial Department of Railways to the effect that six cars of fastenings, angle bars, bolts and spikes were dispatched from the Joliet Works of the Illinois Steel Company between August 14 and 16, consigned for Victoria.

With the rails expected at once the rest of the track equipment should reach this island simultaneously, and enable work on the island section of the Canadian Northern Railway to be commenced within a very few days. By the time the necessary rails and equipment reach Victoria all the preliminary preparations will have been completed by the engineering staff of the Railway Company and nothing will remain to prevent actual tracklaying on the already graded stretch which will link Victoria with the Nitinat Lake-tide-water to tidewater.

There still remains to be definitely settled the question of loaning an additional thirty miles of rails to the Dominion Government requested by the Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways and Canals, on Thursday last. Formal cabinet action, however, is all that is needed in this connection, when official formula will have been dispensed with in regard to the work in question.
